Making a difference

The benefits of this literacy program really stack up



- An estimated 1 in 6 Yolo County residents can't read and write sufficiently to carry out day-to-day activities.
- Yolo Reads provides free tutoring to adults who want to **improve their reading, writing, spelling and grammar** skills. The program started in July 2007 and received a grant from California Library Literacy Services, part of the California State Library.
- As of Feb. 28, volunteers have provided **2,500 hours of service** and Yolo Reads has given out **463 books** for tutors and learners to use.
- As of March 31, Yolo Reads has served a total of **46 learners**. Yolo Reads currently has **28 learners**.
- In March, in partnership with the Probation Department, 7 Yolo Reads volunteers launched a **tutoring program for incarcerated youth** at the Juvenile Detention Facility in Woodland.
- Yolo Reads has sponsored English conversation groups at the library branches in Davis, Esparto, Winters and West Sacramento.

Learner profile

Satish selected as Writer to Writer finalist

When Satish joined Yolo Reads in October 2008, his goals were to become a better reader and learn to use computers.

Less than a year later, he was selected as a finalist in the 2009 Writer to Writer Challenge organized by California Library Literacy Services.

Satish is originally from Fiji and lived in Hawaii before settling in West Sacramento. A friend told him about Yolo Reads literacy program and he visited the Turner library branch to learn more. Shortly after signing up to be a participant, he was matched with tutor Patrick, a retired school teacher originally from Los Angeles.

Working together to accomplish Satish's short-term goals has helped Satish get closer to reaching his long-term goals. He hopes to attend technical school and, one day, own his own mini-mart. Satish and

Patrick said it's important to focus on small goals as stepping stones to larger goals. This approach, they said, is a good way to achieve success.

One of Satish's smaller goals was to participate in the Writer to Writer Challenge, which is a statewide contest for adult learners. To enter the contest, a learner reads a book of his or her choice and then writes a letter to the book's author. The letters are also submitted to the contest. Finalists and winners are chosen and their letters are published in a booklet, "Writer to Writer: Letters of the Award Winners and Finalists."

The contest deadline in 2009 occurred during the presidential election. Satish is a supporter of Barack Obama and so Patrick suggested he read a biography about this popular candidate. Satish chose "Obama: From Promise to Power" by David Mendell.

Satish was inspired by the similarities between Obama's background and his own. He shared these thoughts in his

letter to Mendell and received a very nice reply from the author.

Satish plans to enter the 2010 Writer to Writer Challenge. He does not yet know which book he is going to read, but it will probably be another non-fiction title. He said he prefers non-fiction because he loves to learn new things about real people and topics. Both Satish and Patrick had positive experiences with the Writer to Writer Challenge

and they encourage other Yolo Reads participants to enter in 2010. Patrick also mentioned how much he enjoyed hearing the winners and finalists share their letters during the 2009 awards ceremony.

Satish said he is very thankful to the Yolo Reads program for helping him improve his reading and writing skills. He remains dedicated to accomplishing his goals and is ready to take on the challenges ahead, one step at a time.

I went to the library looking for books to reach her goal. Since I greatly admire our new president, your book seemed a perfect answer for me.


You wrote very good things about his


July 2, 2009




