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# Literacy supporters can sign declaration to Obama

Our nation faces a silent yet growing crisis: low literacy. More than 93 million American adults have limited literacy skills.

The Declaration for the Right to Literacy scroll has traveled across the United States and will be given to President Obama on Sept. 8 — International Literacy Day.

Tell President Obama you support the right to literacy by signing the scroll. The scroll may be signed at the Yolo County Library administration office, at 226 Buckeye St. in Woodland on Friday, Aug. 27, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The scroll also will be available at the Central Valley Library Literacy Network's Read. Write. Now! Conference on Aug. 28.

### **Q&A:** Leadership institute

At the Adult Learner Leadership Institute (ALLI), adult learners participate in a program that helps them improve their leadership, communication and advocacy skills.

Raquel, a resident of Winters, joined Yolo Reads one year ago and recently participated in ALLI. She answered a few questions about her experience.

### Q: How did you learn about ALLI

A: I learned about ALLI from Heather (Bratt, who leads Yolo Reads) and my first tutor, Phillipa.

Q: Why did you decide

#### to participate in ALLI?

A: I wanted to participate in the program to meet new people and experience different cultures.

#### Q: What did you like best about the program?

A: It helped me to be more confident, especially when speaking with new people. Also, I learned a lot about team-building and the importance of working together.

### Q: What did you think of the learner facilitators?

A: Having Learners as facilitators really helped me to relax and be more comfortable meeting new people. They understand the

## Yolo Reads learner achieves U.S. citizenship

After months of studying, Yolo Reads participant Analilia has become the literacy program's first learner to take and pass the test for U.S. citizenship.

The Winters resident, originally from Mexico, set the goal shortly after joining Yolo Reads in June 2009. Analilia said her family has offered tremendous support and encouragement. And her tutors, first Ellie and then Linda, both of Winters, have helped her prepare.

Analilia used several strategies to study for the citizenship exam. Yolo Reads served as one resource, providing materials to help her prepare. Heather Bratt, who runs the Yolo Reads program, loaned her "Civics and Literacy" and "Ready for the Interview" (available as books and CDs) by Lynne Weinthaub. From these books, Analilia made flash cards with the information she needed to learn.

Linda helped Analilia conduct Internet searches for answers to possible test questions. The Winters library staff was always ready to assist with additional resources. Linda also suggested writing out the answers to the study questions as a way of memorizing the information, which worked very well as a study tool.

When asked about the

biggest challenge in studying for the exam, Analilia said, "Learning the connections between the different branches of government and the history behind it was difficult for me."

To become a citizen, Analilia had to submit an application to take the exam. After submitting the application, she was contacted to make an appointment. This appointment took place about four weeks after sending in the application.

During the exam, she was required to answer several questions from the study materials and then perform a short written exercise. Her first thought after being told she passed the exam was, "Finally, studying for this is over. I'm free to study other things!"

Once her initial sense of relief passed, she thought, "I feel proud of myself because this was hard and I wasn't sure if it would happen. Now I feel like I can do even more."

Analilia is now working toward a new goal. She would like to obtain a cosmetology license. She and Linda have once again turned to the library's resources and are reading through a book about cosmetology. Analilia has researched the school she would like to attend but it is currently not accepting new students. In the meantime, she and Linda will continue studying on their own.

Both Analilia and Linda offered advice for literacy program learners thinking about pursuing citizenship. "Studying for citizenship was like being part of a team," Analilia said. "Yolo Reads was a large support in studying. Heather, Linda and the library staff felt like a part of my team and when I succeeded it was like the whole team was succeeding."

Linda adds, "There's no deadline for submitting your application for the citizenship exam. You can take as much time as you need to prepare. There's no pressure because you can start any time and wait until you are ready to apply."

Analilia and Linda said they have had a great experience with Yolo Reads and encourage those thinking about participating to join the program.

Analilia was involved in literacy programs off and on for eight years before joining Yolo Reads in June 2009. Since then, her participation has been uninterrupted.

Analilia said Yolo Reads has "opened a big window into the English language" for her. And, she added, "I now have the confidence to question and engage strangers in English."

She advises new learners to "leave their nervousness behind and commit to setting aside time for learning." Tutors are very helpful and it's OK to make mistakes, she said. Linda adds that the most important thing is to make sure it's fun.

challenges learners have and so can be really helpful if someone is nervous.

Q: Are you interested in serving as a facilitator?

A: Yes, but I would want to learn a bit more before doing it.

Q: Would you recommend the program?

A: Yes, absolutely. It was such a great experience and many of the people that go have the same problems as each other so you can share solutions.

Q: Would you participate in the program again?

A: Yes, definitely.

Q: Do you have any advice/tips for Learners that are interested in the program?

A: Even if you are nervous or not confident it's ok to go because everyone there understands how you feel and will help you to relax and be able to speak in front of the group.

Q: Is there anything you would like to add about ALLI?

A: The program allowed me to be an advocate for Yolo Reads and ALLI by helping me to write a letter to my senator about how useful adult literacy programs are.

-- ALLI is offered once a year. Participants attend training one Saturday each month over a period of six months from January to June. Watch for announcements this fall about the next ALLI session.


