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A Primate's Memoir Community Book Read Discussions Begin Feb. 26

(Woodland, CA) – On Tuesday, February 26 at 6:00 p.m., Yolo County's Mary L. Stephens Davis Branch Library, located at 315 E. 14th Street in Davis, will host a discussion on the book, *A Primate's Memoir*, authored by Stanford University neurobiologist Robert Sapolsky. The discussion is part of the 2012-13 Open Access Science community book read, a project of the Yolo County Library and the Center for Population Biology at UC Davis whose graduate students will facilitate the discussion.

A Primate's Memoir details the trysts and turmoil of Dr. Sapolsky's chosen baboon troop while weaving in the author's observations of African society and politics following ten years living among and studying wild baboons in Kenya. In a broad comparison between *Homo sapiens* and baboons at the physiological, behavioral and ecological levels, this book and the community discussions, will provoke questions on what makes us human.

"One of the pleasures of reading a book is sharing ideas from it with others," said Yolo County Librarian Patty Wong. "A Primate's Memoir is full of tantalizing facts and dramatic events that will stimulate vital conversations."

Dr. Sapolsky was also featured in the National Geographic special, "Killer Stress" concerning the purpose and effects of stress hormones. Entertaining video clips of his popular lectures will be shown as part of the Open Access Science community book read discussions.
