  - 5) Seek out grant opportunities to offer services to the families of offenders so that there may be a holistic approach to re-entry
  - 6) Need full array of services in West Sacramento that county/Woodland have:
    - a) Treatment
    - b) Housing
    - c) West Sacramento Day Reporting Center
  - b. Goal 2: Restore Victims and the Community (District Attorney Reisig)

- Restitution (\* it is a form of accountability) develop process to get restitution form inmates/1170h
- 2) Communication to victims regarding re-entry process
- 3) Restorative justice/direct victim-offender conference
- Restitution \*restorative justice option? To compensate victims/community; community work crews
- Opportunity for direct communication with victims regarding acceptable restitution; \*alternatives to money
- 6) Develop infrastructure to support above point
- 7) Provide victim services in West Sac!
- 8) Consistent communication with victim regarding process and needs
- 9) Restore community by \*Broken Windows Approach
  - a) Engage offenders in clean-up
  - b) Support re-integration programs

#### c. Goal 3: Hold Offenders Accountable (Sheriff Ed Prieto, Undersheriff Tom Lopez)

- 1) Jobs, mental health and drug/alcohol treatment
- 2) Expand capacity to utilize flash incarceration as a tool of compliance and effecting short-term behavior compliance
- 3) Decrease good time credits so that they are meaningful and not "freebies"
- 4) Increase opportunities for incentives to those who choose to participate in positive programming
- 5) CPTED crime prevention through environmental design (trim trees, vehicles, etc.)
- 6) Continue to use data & cost benefits
- 7) Need for housing

## d. Goal 4: Build Offender Competency and Support Community Reintegration (Tracie Olson, Public Defender)

- 1) Services in West Sac
  - a) Housing and services together
  - b) Residential in West Sac detox
  - c) Transportation to services

## e. Goal 5: Reduce Recidivism (Chief Cardall)

- 1) Increase the point of contact with offenders with moving out of jail or transitioning from one treatment program to another to ensure continuity
- 2) Expands the capacity of programming opportunities for offenders
- 3) Transportation opportunities
- 4) Prevention methods to keep juveniles from entering the system
- 5) Addressing offenders' communities/peer groups/families vs just individual to prevent individual from going back to negative behaviors
- 6) Increase incentive opportunities
- 7) Break negative generational cycles
