  - The group is exploring who they recommend would need to be reached out to in regards to support for this population: emergency rooms, primary care physicians, information for senior centers, and discharge planning are all being considered
  - Following an accident, there is a significant impact on lifestyle

Health Officer Update:

- Influenza activity is increasing and is now widespread throughout much of the nation, though still characterized as “regional” in California. Please remember to wash your hands and cover your cough.
- The Ebola epidemic continues in Guinea, Sierra Leone and Liberia, with over 20,000 cases and 8,000 deaths. As of January 6, Mali is declared free of Ebola disease as there have been no new cases in 6 weeks in that country.
- California Department of Public Health has already released kindergarten immunization data for Fall 2014, 6 months ahead of their usual schedule. This is the first school year in which the new personal belief exemption (PBE) law was in effect. There was a small but consistent decrease in PBE’s statewide and in almost all counties. There was a corresponding increase in both up-to-date immunization and conditional entrant percentages. Statewide, PBE’s went from 3.1% in 2013 to 2.5% in 2014, a .6% decrease. In Yolo County, PBE’s went from 3.7% to 3.2%, a .5% decrease. A more detailed presentation can be provided at a later date if the Council desires.

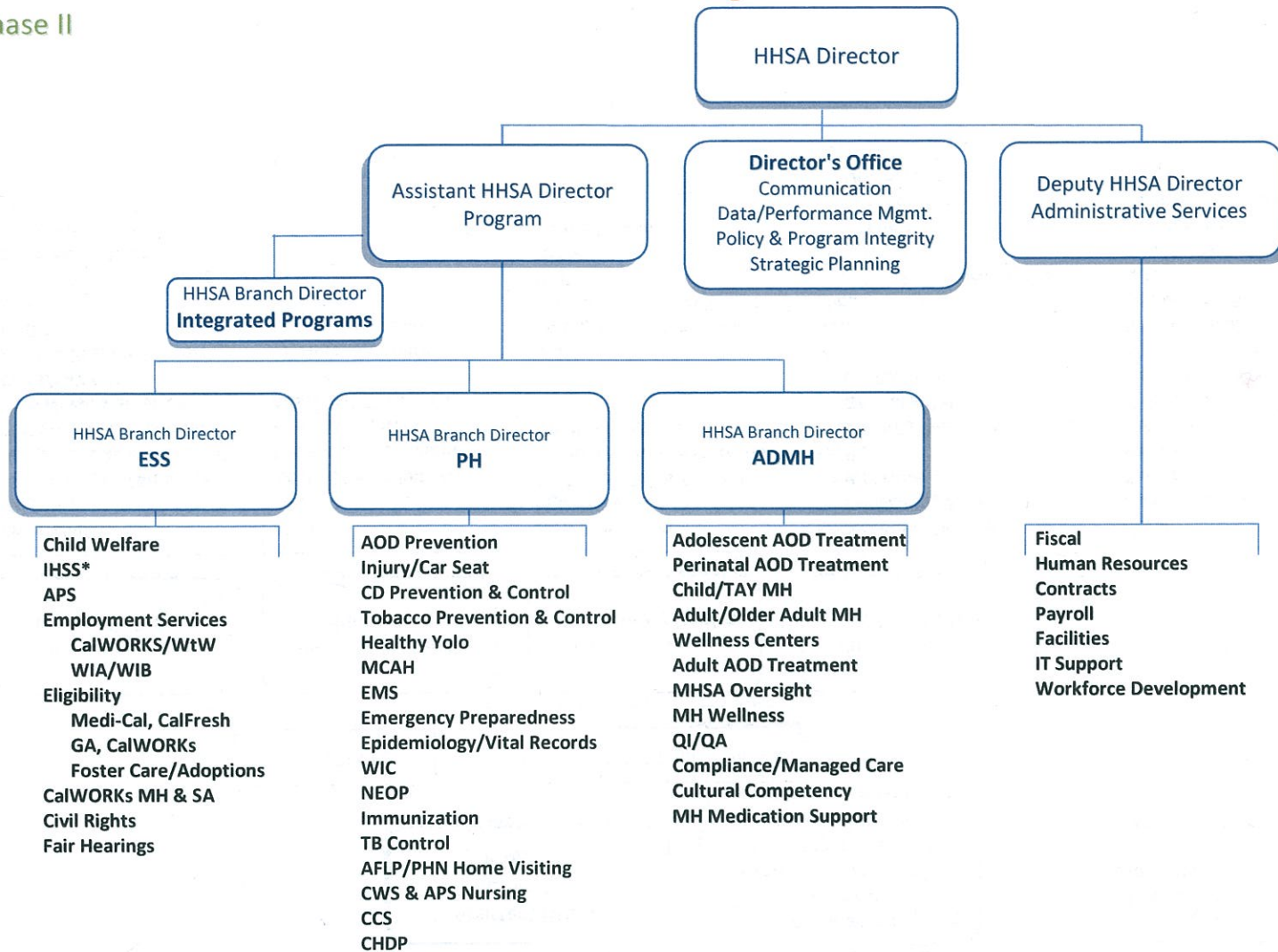

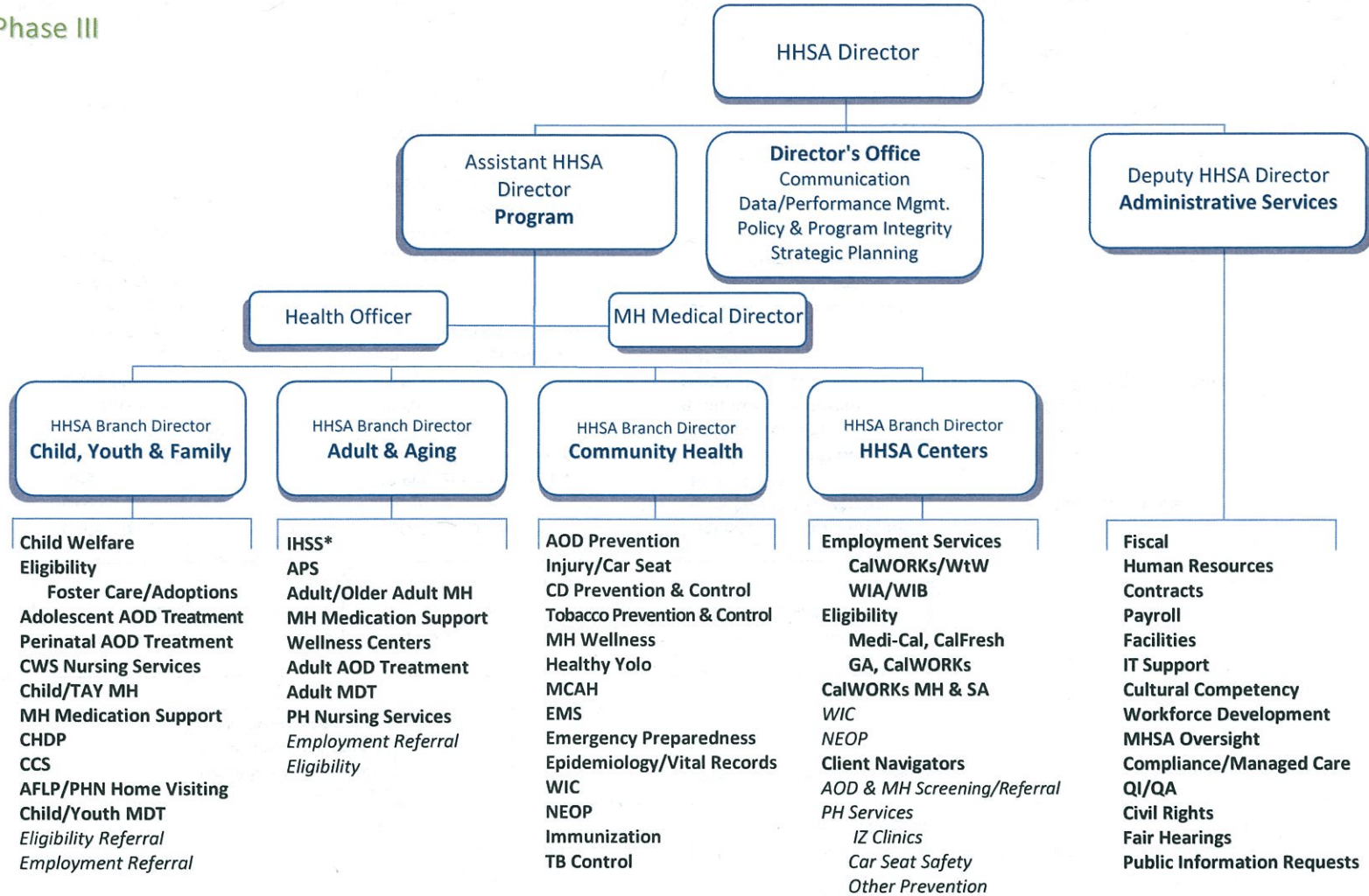

**Outline:**

- Why are we updating the County well ordinance ?

**Why are we updating the Ordinance ?**

--- To meet with the State mandate

- The current County well ordinance is out of compliance with minimum state standards
- County well ordinance was written in 1976
- State Model Well Standards Ordinance was introduced in 1989

**Why are we proposing "Inspection at time of Sale" ?**

--- To address increasing public health concerns over the aging and failing domestic wells and septic systems

- Board of Supervisors requested Environmental Health to update the County Ordinance to require water quality analyses, inspection for domestic well and disclosure of well and water quality conditions at time of sale.


**What is "Inspection at Time of Sale"**

- The inspection will include both domestic drinking water well and septic system.
- The water well inspection report will include:
  - Water quality test results (Total Coliform, Nitrate, Arsenic, Chromium VI)
  - Wellhead observation – setback to contaminating sources
  - Wellhead construction – Well Completion Report, grading within 10' of the wellhead, elevation of the casing height, etc.
  - The presence of abandoned wells
- The inspection must be conducted by a qualified professional, including C-57 license holder, within 12 months prior to the transfer of title.
- Inspection report shall be submitted to Environmental Health for review, approval and filing.
- Environmental Health will issue \_\_\_\_\_ when conditions met.


**Disclosure**

- For public disclosure and to protect the public health of future property owners, any levels that are above the regulated limit shall be recorded on the property deed.

### Construction deficiencies that we saw during inspection



A domestic well was missing pad



The rubber o ring for well cap was bulging and appeared aged.



The well bolt was loosely attached to the well cap

### Nitrate is prevalent in Yolo County wells


- **Source:** Regional Conjunctive Use Enhancement, Nitrate Fingerprinting and Groundwater Age Determination Study prepared by Yolo County Flood Control and Water conservation District
- **Finding:** From March 31, 2007 to July 28, 2009, 117 well construction permits were issued for domestic drinking water wells in Yolo County. During this time, 15% (18) of these newly drilled wells produced water exceeding the MCL of 45 mg/L nitrate as nitrate, while 35% (41) were above 22.5 mg/L nitrate, more than halfway to the MCL.

- Continue seek stakeholders' input, January to March, 2015
- Incorporate comments from the BOS and revise, March, 2015
- Distribute final draft to stakeholders for comments, April 2015
- Incorporate changes and present to BOS, 1<sup>st</sup> reading, June 2015
- Incorporate changes and present to BOS, 2<sup>nd</sup> reading, July 2015
- Consider an adoption of new ordinance by BOS, August 2015.

## Yolo County E-cigarette Survey



Surveys were collected in English & Spanish by the youth coalition at Casa del Sol community center, Yolo County Fair, & Pioneer High School.

Respondents were from: Woodland, Davis, West Sacramento, Winters, Esparto, Yolo & Knights Landing.

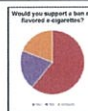
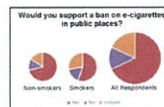
E-cigarette Use:  
 18% had ever used an e-cigarette  
 55% of smokers had tried an e-cigarette  
 9% of non-smokers had tried an e-cigarette

## Where in Yolo County are E-cigarettes Being Used?



43% of respondents reported seeing e-cigarettes used inside a public place.

## Is there support for e-cigarette bans



- 68% of those surveyed said they would support a ban on e-cigarette use in public places.
- 64% said they would support a ban on flavored e-cigarettes. In 2009 flavored cigarettes were banned because of their attractiveness to teenagers.
- 76% said they would support a ban on e-cigarette advertising near schools. Research shows tobacco ads are more powerful than peer pressure.

## E-cigarettes & Passive Vaping

November 2014 issue of Environmental Research  
 Cigarettes vs. e-cigarettes: Passive exposure at home measured by means of airborne marker and biomarkers

"In conclusion, our data show that the levels of airborne nicotine concentrations in the e-cigarette users' homes were higher than those in the control homes, and that concentration of biomarkers among non-smokers exposed to e-cigarettes vapor and to conventional cigarettes was statistically similar."

"Our results show that non-smokers passively exposed to e-cigarettes absorb nicotine."

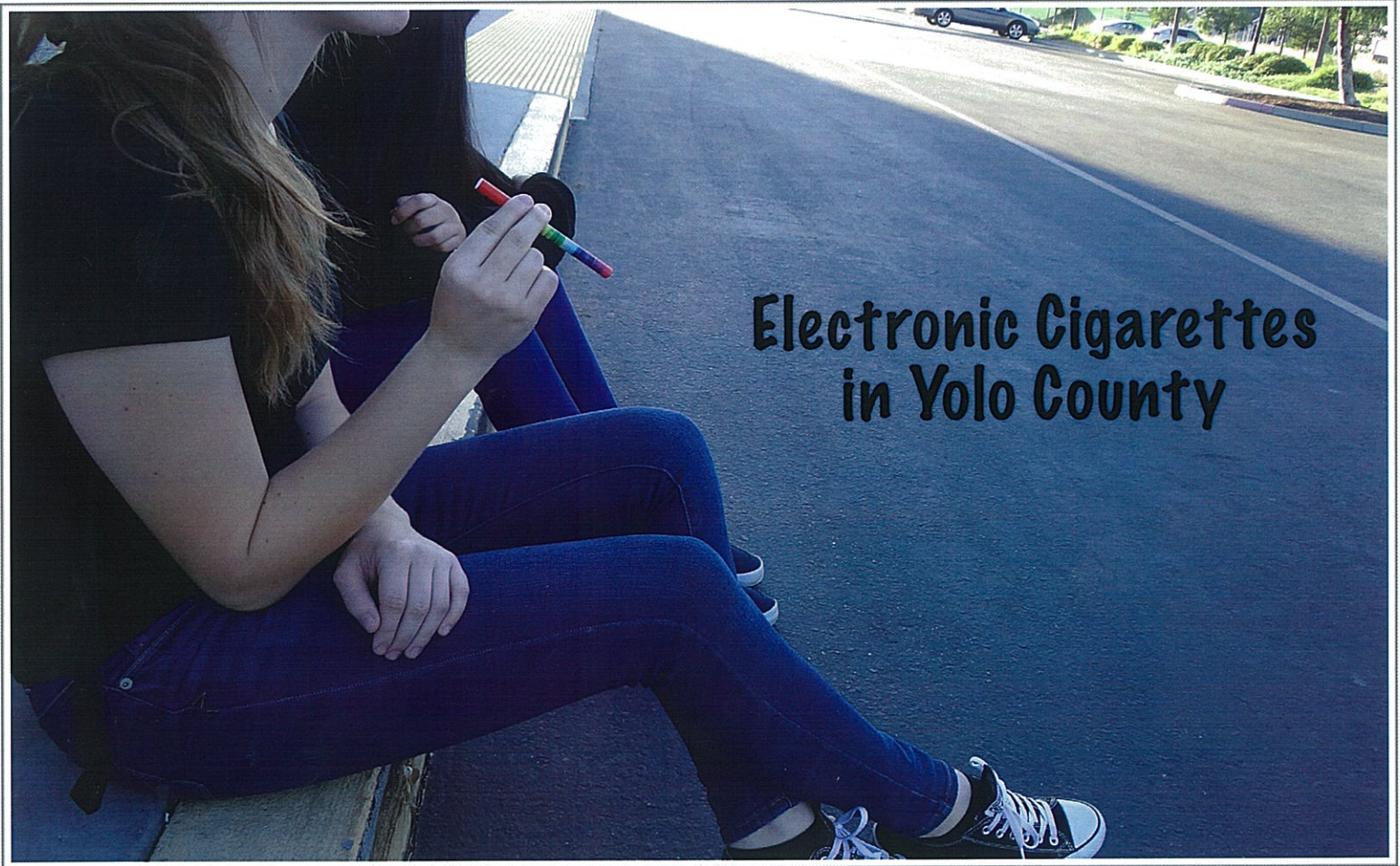

### Second-hand vaping does exist.

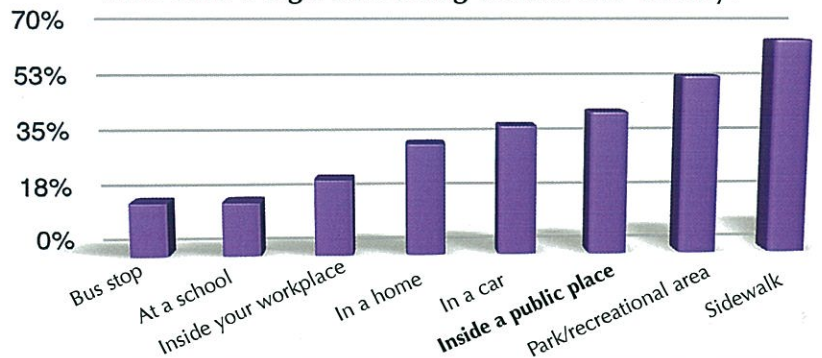

## Electronic Cigarettes in Yolo County

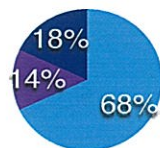
43% of respondents reported e-cigarettes being used **inside** public places

### Where are e-cigarettes being used in Yolo County?



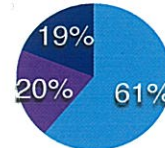
## Survey Says:

Would you support a ban on e-cigarette use in public places?



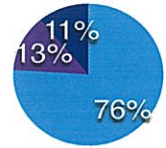
