Objective 2e: Expand the number of community service hours completed by 5% Establish Formal Community Service Program by FY 2016

Designated Lead Department(s): Probation (Ray Simmons)

Partner Department(s): Probation (Nate Palmer), District Attorney (Steve Mount), Public Defender (Allison Zuvella), Sheriff's Office (Larry Cecchettini), Superior Courts (Cathy Berger), Day Reporting Center (Maggi Schubert and Marc Nigel)

Summary of Process: The probation department organized a planning meeting in December 2014 to assess the active opportunities for community service in Yolo County. The first meeting concluded a review of current options for community service. Only the courts currently manage compliance check-ins for community service. Both the DRC and Probation's Work Program (if physically unable to perform labor) have community service as a part of participants' program obligations. Outreach to judges is in progress and will be discuss at the next group meeting in late January. Probation will review options to formally manage check-ins for completion of court ordered community supervision through a list of vetted community service providers.

Outcome Measurement(s): Number of community service hours completed increases by 5%, establish a formal Community Service Program, Develop baseline data with Courts to measure successful increases of completed hours.

Anticipated Time Line: Establish meetings beginning December 5th, 2014.. Completion of Objective by FY 2016

Goal 3: Hold Offenders Accountable

Objective 3h: Maintain capacity of the pretrial program by 10% (100 participants) and maintain its effectiveness

Designated Lead Department(s): Probation (Ray Simmons)

Summary of Process: Probation's Pretrial conducted an internal review of caseloads and was able to expand caseload capacity from 100 to 120 with an average monthly population in October of 115. Since the passage of Proposition 47, the caseload of Pre-Trial has fluctuated. It was down to 80, and is now back up to around 105(December 15th). Probation, along with several other partners must wait to see how Prop 47 settles out to determine new strategies to achieve this goal without adding additional funding to the program.

Outcome Measurement(s): Increase numbers served by 10% Maintain capacity (current capacity <=100). Maintain effectiveness at current levels (currently approx. 15% FTA).

Anticipated Time Line: Meeting continuously to monitor population changes. Completion of Objective by FY 2016

Objective: Allow Yolo Superior Court's New Case Management System to interface with related Justice Partner's systems and facilitate data exchange.

Partner Department(s): Court, District Attorney, Probation, Public Defender, Yolo County Sheriff

Summary of Process: The Superior Court of California County Yolo has contracted SunGard to develop a set of interface portals (or API's), that will allow the Court's Case Management System to interface with their justice partners. Benefits of this portal include the ability to provide for more consistent data, which would aid statistical reporting, reduce duplicate data entry and ensure critical data is available when needed. Once the portal is ready, Court will coordinate with each related Justice Partner to allow systems to interface.

Outcome Measurement(s): 10/2013 Court signed contract with Sungard; 06/2014 Sungard completed API's programming; 07/2014 Sungard completed post-deployment testing; 08/2014 Court released technical documentation; 12/2014 Court ready to initiate agency deployment

Summary of Process: The Probation Department and Public Defenders Office will conduct a review of specialty court programs with the Criminal Justice Cabinet. This review will cover the difficulties and successes of current specialty courts and identify potential pilot opportunities for other special courts.

Outcome Measurement(s): Obtain decision on whether to pursue additional specialty courts.

Objective 5d: Reduce the recidivism rate of all sentenced offenders in the system (probation and jail) by 5% by 2016.

Designated Lead Department(s): Probation (Ryan Pistochini)

Partner Department(s): Steve Mount (District Attorney), Tracie Olson (Public Defender), Brent Cardall (Probation), Tina Day (Sheriff)

Summary of Process: The subcommittee met in February 2015 and agreed to a recidivism definition matrix. The detail of this matrix is attached.

Outcome Measurement(s): Should the CCP adopt the attached document, the CCP members can focus on data collection and gathering.

Anticipated Time Line: Next steps are to work towards obtaining and analyzing data from a variety of sources to begin populating the matrix. This will be done in collaboration with the CCP data workgroup.

Attachment 1

Adult Recidivism Definition for Yolo County

A subcommittee on recidivism definition met and agreed upon a recidivism matrix to guide the development of centrally located data repository for use by CCP members. The matrix is below:

Stage	Time periods	
Arrested	1 & 3 year periods	
Booked	1 & 3 year periods	
Filed	1 & 3 year periods	
Convicted	1 & 3 year periods	

The matrix proposes looking at recidivism at four stages of the criminal justice system over two time periods. The four stages are arrests, booked, filed and conviction. Arrests consider recidivism rates of offenders who are arrested. This will likely include only arrests reported by the four cities and the County. Receiving arrest information from state law enforcement entities or out-of-county entities may be difficult. Tracking recidivism rates by those booked will help determine the impact on the jail, and capture arrests by state law enforcement booked in Yolo County. Filed tracks the number of offenders who have charged filed against them. This is believed to be a smaller population than the number of reoffending people booked. Finally, tracking recidivism by convictions allows the CCP to track recidivism according to BSCC requirements.

The time periods are new felony or misdemeanor crimes committed one year and three years from release from custody or from placement on supervision.
