Library's 'LEST WE FORGET' Project Shares the Story of Yolo County Residents in World War I

(Woodland, CA) – The Yolo County Library invites everyone to attend "LEST WE FORGET" which reveals the story of World War I and Yolo County in a four part series. The first part, titled "Now We Are At War," focuses on how the different communities of Yolo County responded to America's declaration of war on Germany on April 6, 1917 and how each resident, male and female, adult and child, were now expected to be fully engaged and supportive of the war.

"By honoring the veterans of the past, we let the veterans of today know that they too will not be forgotten," said "LEST WE FORGET" Researcher Mel Russell. "Those who serve do not do so in vain and will always be remembered here in Yolo."

World War I was fought from 1914 to 1918 and resulted in 8 million deaths, 21 million wounded and countless millions displaced. When America joined on April 6, 1917, President Wilson immediately announced that much of the war would be run at the local level and every county was to be individually responsible for selecting their quota of young men who would serve, raising their share of the money needed to pay for the war and growing their portion of crops needed to feed the starving in Europe and

the new National Army of over 3 million men. At that time, Yolo County was one of the richest counties in all the United States and at the forefront of the all-out national war effort.
