9:00 A.M. CALL TO ORDER

1. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS – Michael Wilkes, Chair

4. PUBLIC COMMENT

5. STATE AND COUNTY UPDATE - Jill Cook, CAO Representative

FY17-18 Budget

- The County is waiting for the Governor's May revise of the budget, which should include an update on IHSS funding.
- Locally, HHSA has seen major funding decreases in CalWORKs and CalFresh, however, the social services
 budget has greatly improved from last year and is relying less on fund balance. The Mental Health budget
 will also have a shortfall but it unclear by how much at this time. In Public Health, there have been
 reductions in one-time costs; Public Health relies on over \$3 million in one-time funds. To cover those
 reductions, vacant positions have been unfunded. Public Health is anticipating a close to double allocation
 increase in tobacco due to the tax.

Cannabis:

• The County has postponed conversation on cannabis policies until after State regulations are release, which could be by the end of the month.

- **6.** BOARD OF SUPERVISORS UPDATE Supervisor Saylor
 - The **ACA forum** in March, which focused on the changes in the implementation of the Affordable Care Act and the implications of the proposed repeal, is available <u>online</u> at Davis Media Access.
 - **IHSS Funding**: The State of California is considering a proposal to transfer back the financial responsibility to the Counties. That program provides in home support for individuals who might not otherwise be able to

stay in their homes. There are already challenges in the program in trying to find appropriate provider matches, as well as a shortage of providers on the registry. The program has tremendous values but is at risk as these transitions take place. The California State Association of Counties is actively negotiating with the state.

- **Flavored Tobacco:** Last month, Supervisor Saylor was part of a panel with Tobacco Program Manager Steve Jensen presenting information to northern counties. This panel focused on flavored tobacco policy and limiting of Tobacco Retail Licenses. Recently, the Board of Supervisors had approved an ordinance banning the sale of flavored tobacco in the unincorporated areas of Yolo. This ordinance is actually rare and this panel was a great opportunity to recognize the efforts of Yolo County.
- MHSA Plan: The Board of Supervisors adopted the MHSA three-year plan. Focuses of the plan include early childhood screenings and treatment and outreach to cultural populations (Spanish and Russian).

7. HEALTH OFFICER REPORT – Ron Chapman, Health Officer

- Oral Health: A draft county-wide oral health strategic plan has been created and will be reviewed on Monday, April 17th. An invitation has gone out to the Health Council and feedback is greatly appreciated if you can attend. Once the Oral Health Strategic Plan is finalized, Dr. Chapman would like to present it to Health Council.
- County Health Rankings: The University of Wisconson provides annual County Health Rankings. In the last five years, Yolo County has been ranked as the 5th healthiest county in California; however, this year it is the 14th. Dr. Chapman and the Epidemiological team are reviewing the data for more information. It appears that Yolo County has not gotten worse but in fact, other counties are speeding ahead. Dr. Chapman would like to provide a presentation about these rankings.
- **Kindergarten Immunization Rates:** With the implementation of SB 277 which restricted vaccine exemptions, Yolo County is seeing the highest Kindergarten vaccination rates ever at 96.6%. In addition, the personal belief exemption rate has gone from 3.1% to .6%. The rate improvements seen also include private schools, which tend to have the lowest vaccination rates.
- **Vector-Borne Illnesses:** Yolo County is working closely with the Sacrament-Yolo Vector Control in preparation of the upcoming mosquito season. Typically, there are more mosquitoes during a drought due to the standing water but there is already mosquito activity. There is a potential for increased rates of West Nile Virus; in addition Zika is being closely monitored. The best efforts to reduce mosquito bites are:
 - Get rid of standing water; some mosquitoes can breed in just a thimble full of water.
 - Stay inside at dawn and dusk.
 - Wear long sleeve shirts and pants when outside
 - o Utilize Deet

8. COMMUNITY HEALTH BRANCH REPORT – Jan Babb, Community Health Branch Director HANDOUT

April Community Health Branch Report

- Yolo County HHSA has received a grant from CMSP to focus on diabetes self-management. CommuniCare
 Health Centers will be contracted to provide the diabetes management, with additional efforts including
 outreach to individuals who are uninsured.
- On April 20th from 11:00 am 2:00 pm, the annual HHSA Health & Wellness Fair will be taking place at Empower Yolo.
- Anna Sutton has been invited to participate in a national Expert Work Group being led by ACOG on maternal
 mental health disorders.
- In February, the Community Health Branch submitted the required documents needed for Public Health Accreditation. Since then, there has been the opportunity to upload additional documentation and provide clarification for select items. A site visit team has now been assigned to Yolo County and they will be

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working on further review of those documents. A site visit is anticipated in September and the Accreditation Team is beginning to work on the logistics around that visit.

9. Nominating Committee – Michael Wilkes, Chair

- Per the Bylaws, there is an election for chair and vice-chair annual. Typically, two or three voting members form a nominating committee and work via a phone call to discuss the nominations.
- Carri Zeigler and Chris Kelsch volunteer to serve on the nominating committee.

10. REPORT OUT FROM SHARPS DISPOSAL SUBCOMMITTEE - Michael Wilkes, Chair

 After the presentation from Harm Reduction Services in March, a Sharps Disposal Subcommittee was formed. The subcommittee has met once and is in the process of gathering additional city specific information.
