9:00 A.M. CALL TO ORDER

4. PUBLIC COMMENT

- John Troidl reported on the Insure the Uninsured Project (ITUP) Conference he attended. John stated they
 will lay the groundwork for health reform in California for 2018. The conference highlighted anticipated
 federal challenges as well as opportunities for the state to preserve and expand gains in coverage and health
 improvement.
- 5. STATE AND COUNTY UPDATE Patrick Blacklock, CAO
 - **County Medical Services Program (CMSP):** Patrick reported he started his term on the CMSP Governing Board; and is excited to be the representative for Yolo County. As CMSP moves forward, Patrick hopes the Health Council will be a sounding board and provide feedback as CMSP considers new policies and ideas.
 - **Cannabis**: In January, the Board of Supervisors held a workshop focused on cannabis. The intent of the workshop was to develop consistency to long term direction, and out of the workshop the board developed a three pronged policy:
 - I. Place a general tax measure on the June ballot, to tax all aspects of commercial cannabis processes in the unincorporated area. If the voters approve the tax measure, it will allow the board to tax any of the license categories associated with commercial cultivation in the unincorporated area.
 - II. Fast track development agreement process, to allow growers with an existing license, who want to put a significant investment into greenhouses; for those who are compliant, provide them a longer-term investment.

III. Completing the development of the comprehensive land use regulations, this will move the regulatory program for cultivation permits from a business license process only, to a traditional land use process.

The tax measure requires a majority vote to pass, and if it passes, the revenue generated from the tax could be used to fund criminal enforcement of illegal cultivation, early childhood intervention and prevention, youth development, rural infrastructure or any other general governmental purpose. If the tax measure does not pass, or is successfully challenged, cultivation will wind down.

6. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS UPDATE – Assistant Deputy Jessica Jones

- Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) Tour: Jessica reported the District 2 team had the opportunity to tour the HHSA locations in Woodland. Jessica stated it was nice to see the different services, and the opportunities that are provided to the community.
- **Proposition 47 Program:** Jessica reported at the last Board meeting, the Board approved the agreement with Sacramento County Office of Education to provide outreach, assessment for intensive care management treatment, and housing assistance services for clients eligible for Proposition 47, Steps for Success Program, for the period of November 16, 2017 to August 15, 2020.
- **HHSA Board Update:** HHSA has several efforts underway to expand services for residents experiencing mental health crisis. Some of the programs include:
 - 24/7 Mental Health Crisis Response
 - o 5150 Hospital Diversion Program
 - o Mental Health Urgent Care services provided in West Sacramento (Brochure)
 - o Navigation Center and a residential care facility will be opening in Davis

7. COMMUNITY HEALTH BRANCH REPORT – Mimi Hall, Community Health Director Branch Report

- Infectious Disease (ID):
 - Influenza The Infectious Disease unit has been in constant coordination, partnership, and collaborating with providers, partners, and hospitals.
 - UC Davis Partnership The Infectious Disease Unit partnered with the UC Davis Student Health Centers so that Harm Reduction Messaging can go out through the student health messaging system.
 - Sacramento WISH Collaborative The Infectious Disease and Maternal Child Adolescent Health programs presented a program overview at the Sacramento WISH Collaborative. The program overview highlighted the importance of collaboration between Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health programs with Communicable/Infectious Disease programs.
- Maternal Child Adolescent Health (MCAH):
 - The Blue Dot Project Maternal Mental Health campaign started in Yolo County, and has been taken on by the National Blue Dot Project. They are using the toolkit that started here in Yolo County.
- Women Infants and Children (WIC):
 - WIC and Progress House Partnership The Women Infants and Children peer counseling program have a close relationship in servicing the women of Progress House. A Breastfeeding Peer Counselor facilitates a breastfeeding support group once a month, completes monthly telephone follow ups, and is able to give them one on one support as needed.

Mimi Hall spoke briefly on the public health issues surrounding cannabis use as Proposition 64 is implemented across California.

8. HEALTH OFFICER REPORT – Ron Chapman, Heath Officer

Health Report

- Influenza: The flu season is starting to trend down. Six nursing facilities closed for seven days due to outbreaks; but the facilities responded fast and instituted all of the measures that were recommended. The number of deaths from Influenza has been much higher than average, and now the numbers look higher than the 2009-10 H1N1 pandemic. California state law requires reporting Influenza deaths under the age of 65 to the health officer. However, in our county, we are tracking all deaths from Influenza, and the total is higher than in past years.
- **Oral Health Advisory Committee:** The funding has started from the state, so our first major activity will be the Oral Health Summit for decision makers in Yolo County. The committee is looking at the end of May or early June and the Oral Health Advisory Committee will be extending an invitation for Health Council representation for that meeting. More information to come.
- **Tobacco**: The Tobacco program, in collaboration with the District Attorney's office, operates sting operations to see which retailers are selling to minors. Out of the 300 sting operations, 24 sells were made to minors. The Tobacco program is now in the process of sending out letters to the retailers telling them their license to sell tobacco is being revoked for 10 days. If the retailers continue to sell in future sting operations, the penalty goes up significantly, where eventually their tobacco license will be revoked.

9. Addressing the Impacts of Cannabis – Michael Wilkes, Chair

Michael Wilkes stated the Health Council has an opportunity, at an early stage, to make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors that the council believe furthers the public health of our communities; and opened the floor for discussion.

After the discussion, Dr. Wilkes stated he will send out a request to members asking for those interested in being part of an interest group. The interest group would discuss issues, review data, and present the Health Council recommendations for how we might proceed in addressing the impacts of cannabis.

- 10. **EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES** Kristin Weivoda, EMS Administrator, MHOAC, Yolo County HHSA PowerPoint: <u>Annual Report</u>
 - In 2016-17, the 911 response time for American Medical Response (AMR) was in 94% of system compliance which includes the rural areas of Yolo County.
 - EMS was awarded the American Heart Mission Lifeline[®] Silver Level in 2015, which is an achievement of excellence in how we treat our heart attack victims; and in 2016 EMS was awarded the Gold Level recognition.
 - Cardiac Arrest survival rates to the hospital, in all cardiac rhythms, have improved.
 - Transitioning to ReddiNet that is web based communication system for patient tracking, hospital situational awareness, patient destination, and family reunification. EMS will be live on ReddiNet on March 1st.

11. SHARPS AND MEDICATION DISPOSAL – Marissa Juhler, Waste Reduction and Sustainability Manager, Yolo County Central Landfill

PowerPoint: Division of Integrated Waste Management

- Central Landfill offers free door to door collection of sharps, non-controlled medications, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, cleaners, paints, and pesticides to seniors 65 and older, and to the disabled.
- Every Friday and Saturday, from 7:30am-3:30pm, the Central Landfill is open to receive hazardous waste, including non-controlled medications. The landfill also offers postage paid bags for people to mail in their controlled medication.
- Pharmaceutical kiosks can be found in the lobbies of the Police Departments in Davis, West Sacramento, Winters, Woodland, and at the Sheriff's Department.
