

CA-521 Davis/Woodland/Yolo County Continuum of Care Notice of Funding: Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) 2018

Overview

The State of California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) expects to release a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program in June of 2018. HCD receives funding from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to fund this program. The ESG Program is designed to provide funding for nonprofit providers and local governments to quickly rehouse individuals and families experiencing homelessness while minimizing the trauma and dislocation caused by homelessness. Please note that this notice of funding is only for federal ESG funds. A separate notice of funding will be released, with a blended program intended to utilize State ESG funds and Senate Bill 2 funds.

At this time, HCD has indicated that they have fallen behind on their timeline for releasing the NOFA. However, they do not expect to extend the timeline for local communities to submit the application, which will likely be due in early July. They have indicated that there will very few changes from the NOFA that was released in 2017, and local communities should begin their provider selection process based on the 2017 NOFA.

As with previous NOFAs, HCD will distribute ESG funding based on Continuum of Care (CoC) Service Areas through two different allocations: (1) Some services areas are approved ESG Administrative Entities that will receive and administer State ESG funds directly, and (2) some service areas will receive funds through the Balance of State (BoS) allocation (described in more detail below).

 \rightarrow There are no administrative entities within the HPAC service area, meaning that HPAC will receive funds through the BoS allocation.

Balance of State (BoS)Allocation

Funds from the BoS allocation will be made available to each service areas in two ways:

- 1. **Non-Competitive Rapid Re-Housing Funds:** Each service area will be able to recommend up to two providers for a noncompetitive rapid re-housing grant.
- 2. **Competitive Regional Competition:** Each service area will be able to recommend up to two projects to compete in a regional competition.

Role of HPAC

In the ESG Program, the local Continuum of Care plays an integral role in recommending provider applications in their service area to compete for funds in the regional competition. Applications shall only be considered by HCD if recommended by the CoC. Each service area must conduct a local competition to select applications. The process must:

- \circ Be fair and open
- Avoid conflicts of interest in project selection
- o Consider selection criteria consistent with the criteria used by the State
- Select only eligible activities that are offered consistent with Core Practices, including:
 - Use of coordinated entry

- o Progressive engagement
- Incorporate performance standards set by the State
- \circ $\,$ Consider any other practices promoted or required by HUS $\,$
- \rightarrow HPAC will be responsible for designing a local competition that meets the requirements above when determining funding recommendations for the non-competitive rapid re-housing funds and the competitive regional competition.
