Themes: Mental Health and Substance Abuse

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- ❖ Tracking number of those in jail with mental illness.
- ❖ Educating the community about how to interact with the mentally ill.
- ❖ Specialty courts (mental health court and addiction intervention court) should be supported and expanded.
- ❖ Expand the Day Reporting Center and other treatment programs.
- ❖ Mental health and substance abuse ranked #1 in the top priority areas in criminal justice according to online survey.
- ❖ Mental health and substance abuse ranked #1 in where we should be expending resources according to online survey.
- ❖ Train officers to better interact with the mentally ill.

Themes: Housing

- ❖ Housing was looked at as key to successful reentry and lower recidivism.
 - ❖ Housing and homelessness ranked #2 in the top priority areas in criminal justice according to online survey.
 - ❖ Temporary housing for probationers ranked # 2 in where we should be expending resources according to online survey.
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Themes: CCP Information and Functions

- ❖ There was a desire for the CCP to gather or generate data, and use said data to determine future funding and efforts. The specific data mentioned in this process was the **costs and benefits of our programs**, the **recidivism rate** in Yolo County, and the **cost of putting an offender through the Yolo County criminal justice system**.
- ❖ Explore new ways of interacting with the public that will get the word out more. Specifically the top three methods that were ranked the highest in the online survey were **print media, social media, and online media**.
- ❖ Establish a citizens advisory board to work with the community in addressing criminal justice.
- ❖ Create more partnerships with organizations within the community.
- ❖ Make changes to the CCP webpage to have it be a better resource for the public, such as putting the criminal justice intercept map, the budget, and programs on the webpage.
- ❖ Partner with the Yolo County registrar's office to give offenders voting rights information and registration cards.

Themes: Job Training and Education

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- ❖ Job training and educational opportunities ranked #3 in the top priority areas in criminal justice according to online survey.
- ❖ Looking into creating a partnership with trucking companies to provide work to applicable offenders (Similar to the NCCT work program).
- ❖ Give training in soft technology skills, such as online job applications and using professional social media.

Themes: Jail/ Re-entry

- ❖ Making improvements to the jail, such as access to library materials, an exercise area, and expanded visitation.
- ❖ Finding a way to administer involuntary medication to those with serious mental illnesses to prevent break downs.
- ❖ Have navigators to assist offenders with transitioning from the jail, including signing up for Medi-Cal, transportation assistance, and securing referrals to reentry services.
- ❖ Better diversion of mentally ill offenders from the jail to treatment programs.
- ❖ Expanding diversion programs ranked # 3 in where we should be expending resources according to online survey.
- ❖ Expand resources available for offenders in the jail, including free phone time for inmates, a list of “felony friendly” employers, a mentor or buddy system for reentry, and a mitigation clinic to help with clearing applicable charges.

Themes: Miscellaneous

- ❖ Establish a 24 hour hotline for residents to report mentally ill folks - with EMS and specialist responders.
- ❖ Expand restorative justice efforts.
- ❖ Focus on prevention and diversion.
- ❖ Use community service as a diversion program.
- ❖ Form a county wide task force to study recidivism and its causes in Yolo County, as well as the youth school to jail pipeline.
- ❖ Juvenile justice, while not under our jurisdiction, was a source of concern.
