Health Education

- Tobacco – The Saving Lungs Saving Lives young Adult Coalition will be meeting once again on the UC Davis campus. These student interns will be working with the Tobacco Prevention Program on policies that will protect community members from secondhand smoke in their apartment complexes.
- Child Passenger Safety – Child Passenger Safety week is September 23rd-29th. Our car seat team accepted a declaration on September 11th at the BOS meeting, declaring September 23-29, 2018, as “Child Passenger Safety Week” in Yolo County.

The Child Passenger Safety Program is hosting a checkup event for Child Passenger safety week on September 28th, from 4-6pm, at Sutter Health Davis Hospital. This event is in collaboration with CommuniCare, Sutter Health Davis, and AAA.

The Child Passenger Safety Program was refunded for another year through an OTS grant for the 2018-2019 cycle. The grant begins October 1, 2018.

Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

- The WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Program has been awarded the Loving Support Award of Excellence Gold Award by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). Two WIC programs in California were awarded the award this year. USDA and California Department of Public Health Women, Infants and Children program representatives presented the team the award at the at the Board of Supervisors meeting on October 9, 2018.

Maternal, Child, Adolescent Health (MCAH)

- Nurse Home Visiting program – The Yolo County 3rd Annual Community Baby Shower Fair event on September 29th was a success! We had a total of 58 families register for this year, an increase from last year which was 49. Families came from Woodland, Davis, Sacramento, Arbutle, Knights Landing, Williams and Vacaville. A total of 26 vendors registered and 24 participated in the event. - **Maternal, Child & Adolescent Health (MCAH)** and **Mental Health Services Act (MHSA)** programs in partnership with **Dignity Health/Woodland Healthcare** is pleased to bring Perinatal Mental Health training “**More than Just the Blues: Perinatal Mental Health**” for staff that work with mothers (healthcare provider, nurses, doulas, health educators, medical assistants, social workers, home visitors etc...) on Thursday and Friday, November 29-30, 2018 at the Dignity Health campus in Sacramento. The 1.5 day FREE training (includes meals and CEUs) will cover Perinatal Mental Health basics and provide a “101” in running support groups for mothers. Emergency Medical Services

- The Yolo County EMS Agency (YEMSA), in collaboration with the Foster Care Program, began providing CPR AED and First Aid Training to new foster parent applicants this month. As part of the application process, foster parents are required to achieve CPR certification before any placement in their home. YEMSA provided the first class on September 5th, training 22 new foster applicants in CPR AED and First Aid, and the class was very successful. Classes have been scheduled throughout 2019 with our continued partnership with the Foster Care Program.
- On September 4th 2018 at the Winters City Council Meeting, Yolo County Emergency Medical Services Agency (YEMSA) recognized Winters Fire Fighters, Winters Police Officers, and American Medical Response Paramedics for their quick response and ultimate cardiac arrest “field save” of a 44-year-old man who suffered from sudden cardiac arrest at his home in Winters. The patient’s teenage son was also recognized for his heroic efforts in recognizing the need for immediate CPR and providing it to his father until first responders arrived. The patient’s son learned CPR while participating in the Winters Fire Cadet Program. During the ceremony YEMSA provided lifesaving certificates to the first responders who acted quickly and professionally to provide lifesaving defibrillation and medications. The patient was revived on scene and then taken to a hospital that specializes in the care of cardiac arrest patients. They were able to quickly reverse a complete blockage in the patient’s heart. He had a full recovery and was released home to his family just 3 days later. He and his family were able to attend the ceremony to recognize the responders and his own son who saved his life just 1 month earlier.

In Cardiac Arrest care we use a term called The “Chain of Survival” which refers to the chain of events that must occur in rapid succession to maximize the chances of survival from sudden cardiac arrest. This includes immediate recognition and activation of 911, early CPR, rapid defibrillation, advanced life support, and post-cardiac arrest care. This event is a perfect example of each one of these chains being connected in order to save a life!

YEMSA has made many steps to improving cardiac arrest care in Yolo County. Some of these steps include bystander CPR education, real time CPR feedback to first responders, increased online training opportunities, and participation in a national cardiac arrest survival registry program. We were proud to present these life saver awards to our dedicated first responders.

Communicable Disease

- Tuberculosis – On October 1 will see big changes for how the Yolo County TB Program processes new arrivers.

Civil Surgeons processing immigrants who are currently in the United States and are adjusting their status to permanent residents will now be required to report all instances of Latent TB Infection to the local health department where the individual resides. The TB Program is coordinating with Sac County TB Control to come up with a uniform process for handling these new reports, as well as Yolo residents who are processed in Sacramento County. The TB Program is being asked to follow up and coordinate LTBI treatment, and track treatment completion. Time impact to program is currently unknown.

New immigrants being processed overseas who are 2 years of age or over will all be processed with a TB blood test instead of skin test. This will remove a lot of the children with false positive skin tests for LTBI, but will greatly increase the total number of adults reported to the TB Program, since all adults will be tested. When the new arrivers are report to the TB Program, the TB program must connect them with a provider, which means also connecting them with insurance. The TB Program then cases manages to ensure appropriate diagnostic and treatment is completed. This function is figured in to 5% of the TB Program base award allocation. Time impact is a 4 fold increase of cases.

New immigrants will no longer be handed their chest x ray film or disc at time of immigration. The local TB Program where the new immigrant settles will be responsible for providing that film from a federal portal to the provider completing the necessary U.S. assessment. The portal does not allow for interoperability between systems, and must be printed or download. Staff are currently researching this new task. Time impact unknown.

- Influenza - The Yolo County Immunization Program has begun the Flu Loan Out Program for the 18/19 season. We anticipate loaning out around 2,000 doses again this year. This is the second year of our Probation Program to promote state and federal dose by dose accountability requirements. Agencies placed on Probation for the 18/19 season will have additional requirements, and receive limited allocations while they are demonstrating accountability.

The Immunization Program has once again partnered with the CAO's office for Employee Flu Clinics. The Immunization Program will be offering 13 employee flu clinics, one in each city each month. Employees are also welcome to come to any of the public flu clinics.

The Immunization Program has partnered with the following community partners to offer 5 public flu clinics: Davis Senior Center, City of Winters, Yolo County Housing, City of Woodland. Calendars and locations are posted to the Immunization Program webpage <http://www.yolocounty.org/health-human-services/children-youth/immunization-program>. All immunizations are provided free to the public.

The 18 employee and public flu clinics are being staffed by nurses from throughout HHSA. HHSA leadership and nursing are dedicated to ensuring that the public and those that serve the public are provided optimal opportunities to receive a flu vaccine!
