Emergency Medical Services

- On October 15-18, Yolo County Emergency Medical Service Agency in partnership with our local operational area fire departments and law enforcement agencies conducted a series of emergency training and exercise at the Historical Court House in Woodland, California. The four day training and exercise focused on the Yolo County's response to an active shooter incident using a unified approach, giving the first responders an opportunity to train in real-life situations in real-time. This is the first time in Yolo County history a training and exercise event of this size with all first responder agencies participating has taken place. This training and exercise was extremely successful with over 400 law enforcement, fire and ems personnel in attendance over the four days. The lessons learned from this exercise have positively impacted how Yolo County responds to an active shooter event. Included in this update is a short video showing the collaboration and coordination of all agencies.

Health Education

- Friday Night Live – **FNL Roadwatch**: On Tuesday, October 16, 2018, Friday Night Live (FNL) youth from River City High School and Winters High School participated in a statewide distracted driving event called Roadwatch. Roadwatch is an observational survey where youth from across California witnessed, first hand, the number of distractions that steal the focus of drivers every day.

River City High School FNL members observed 1610 cars for one hour (7am-8am) at the intersection of Jefferson Street & Raider Lane in West Sacramento. Of those observed cars, 13% were driving distracted. The top distractions were: eating & drinking while driving, using a hand held device and reaching for an item.

Winters High School FNL members observed 852 cars during the same time at the intersection of Grant Avenue and Railroad Avenue in Winters. Of those cars observed in Winters, 11% were driving distracted. The top distractions were: eating & drinking while driving, using a hand held device and driving with an animal in their lap.

FNL members that conducted this observational survey at both schools said "it was good experience to see how many people drive distracted." Many students commented that things we commonly do like eating can be a serious (maybe even deadly) while driving.

CHP Press Conference at River City High School: On Monday, October 22, 2018 California Highway Patrol collaborated with River City High School (RCHS) Friday Night Live (FNL) to host a press conference to share the important data that was gathered from Roadwatch 2018 and also kick-off Red Ribbon Week and National Teen Driver Safety week. Speakers included Lynn Goodwin - Program director for the California Friday Night Live Partnership, Brent Newman – California Highway Patrol Chief, Kelly Browning – Executive Director of Impact Teen Drivers, Randy Weisman – Deputy Director of California Office of Traffic Safety and River City High School FNL Co-Presidents, Emily Spicer & Tiffanie Phipps. Emily & Tiffanie’s short presentation from the press conference can be viewed on Instagram by following Yolofnl. They discussed their findings from Roadwatch 2018, the dangers of distracted driving and gave RCHS youth a call to action to have the youth voice be heard and speak up!

Red Ribbon week: Winters High School Friday Night Live (FNL) had a week long Red Ribbon Week promotion where students signed a pledge banner that said “Your Snap Can Wait” promoting teen safe driving.

Their promotion culminated with a lunchtime resource on Friday, October 19, 2018 where students could drive a pedal cart and with fatal vision goggle to experience how driving under the influence is extremely dangerous. Winters High School FNL partnered with local law enforcement agencies to provide information on consequences of driving under the influence and driving distracted. Some the agencies attending this resource fair included Winters Police Department (WPD), WPD K-9 Kepi, Yolo County District Attorney’s Office, California Highway Patrol, Safety Center and Allstate Insurance.

Knights Landing Sci-Tech Charter Academy Yolo County Friday Night Live went out to Knights Landing’s Sci-Tech Academy to promote a Red Ribbon Week celebration at lunch with students from kindergarten through sixth grade. All students received a red ribbon wristband, they signed a Red Ribbon Week banner pledging to make health choices. Students saw visual aids that illustrated healthy lungs vs and unhealthy lung with emphysema and lung cancer. They were also able to compare what a healthy liver looks like versus an unhealthy liver with cirrhosis. Students of all ages asked a lot of great questions and were very engaged in the celebration.
