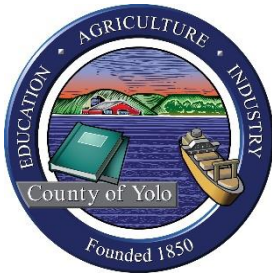

CALL TO ORDER

1. **Welcome and Introductions:** The March 25, 2019 meeting of the Local Mental Health Board was called to order at 7:00 PM. Introductions were made.
2. **Public Comment:** Linda Wight wanted thank the board and James for all the advocacy that LMHB does. Encouraged audience to join NAMI walks and express sincere appreciation for all the help HHSA has provided her.
3. **Approval of Agenda:** Motion to approve from Richard, second by John.
4. **Approval Minutes:** Minutes approved with comment from Richard as a request for the more information from regarding the Mental Health Court.
5. **Member Announcements:**
 - a. James wanted to provide a moment of silence for Noah who recently passed.
 - b. Antonia announced that the system helped her get through a difficult time recently and she's glad the system is working.
 - c. Bret Bradley expressed gratitude for having Jonathon Raven on the LMHB. James agreed and feels fortunate to have Johnathon, Bret and Sheriff Lopez here.
 - d. Jonathon introduced himself and shared his connections with the LMHB as both an advocate and community member.

7. Sheriff Lopez presented an update on the Jail Construction and CIT training.

8. Mental Health Director's Report by Karen Larsen, Mental Health Director, HHSA

a. Pine Tree Gardens-

1. Nicki asked about Pine Tree Gardens and Supervisor Saylor expressed his sincere concerns regarding the people that live that there. He knows the community needs to exist and he believes that the meetings will cut down on mis-communications and will help bring people together. Nicki said the people don't understand the money situation. Supervisor Saylor would like to have a conversation with some people so we can all have a shared understanding of the conversation. Supervisor Saylor expressed how complicated the situation is and that Turning Point is not the operator. There are two operators who run the daily operations. Statewide facilities like PTG are closing because there's not state funding to keep them going. We think there's a statewide need for this and we're thinking about doing some legislative advocacy. Nicki wants to know what the state maximum is for Board and Care. Antonia said she believes that Turning Point has to charge the minimum (about \$1100/month) even if people have different income. Nicki wanted to look in to Regional Center funding and Karen mentioned that regional centers don't compare.

1. Nicki asked about how the presentation went. Karen talked about the plans include eliminating the carve out. Washing, Arizona, New York and Michigan have done its so we have some models to work from.

f. Partnership Health of California-

1. Antonia asked about Partnership Health Plan. Karen said that all Medi-Cal mild moderate are on Partnership Health in Woodland. During the expansion of Medi-Cal mild to moderate Partnership contracted with Beacon. When people come in for services we align them with level of care they need.

g. Yolo County Outpatient Mental Health Services Utilization: Woodland-

1. Sally asked about similar numbers for West Sacramento regarding access. Samantha let her know there was typo on our staff's part and this information is only about Woodland.

h. Drug Medi-Cal SUD Treatment Update-

i. REGULAR AGENDA

1. **Board of Supervisors Report** – Supervisor Don Saylor

- a. Supervisor Saylor shared that tomorrow (3/26), the Board of Supervisor would be meeting as part of the Strategic Planning Process, with the Community Engagement presentation tomorrow. About 500 community members participated in the survey and data collection. Based on what Supervisor Saylor has seen so far, homelessness, and mental health are big priorities for the community.
- b. Pacifico: Over the last couple months there are been many community meetings to discuss these licensed facilities. Pacifico was a privately owned dorm that is now owned by the City. The local residents are concerned about making it an adult residential facility and the delay jeopardizes the project timeline and financing. Supervisor Saylor expressed that we want to do a lot of educating and information sharing to try to work with advocates. It's currently primarily operated by Yolo County Housing and tenants pay rent. Supervisor Saylor is optimistic that there's a path forward.
- c. Pacifico Navigation Center: Supervisor Saylor mentioned that it may not be the right place. Karen mentioned that the money for navigation is not tied to the funds for the Adult Residential Facility so they are not reliant on each other to happen.

2. **Chair Report** – James Glica-Hernandez

- a. Call with CalBHBC
 1. White paper on Emergency Preparedness: James updated the board on the topic of mental health emergency preparedness. He reached out to the County EMS administrator and found out that the County has adopted a crisis response plan. It's not complete, but the County is actively working to improve and to be prepared for a response. James would like to have the EMS administrator attend a meeting to answer questions.
 2. Site visit Ad hoc: Richard shared that he identified 9 places for Site Visits. He would like to prioritize visits to about 1 per month, with the committee appointing a site visit leader. Each visit would have total of 5 visitors (LMHB, NAMI members etc) and the visitation leader would share out at the next LMHB meeting.
 - a. James asked who else would like to participate in site visits. Nicki King and Antonia Tsobanoudis are interested.
 3. Brown Act Reminder: Board members, please send everything to James or Brittany, then James can send out with his approval.
 4. Ethics training reminder: Board members, if you've taken your ethics training, please copy your certificate and send it to Brittany.
 5. Mental Health Court Update: Bret and Jonathan- Jonathan participated in the Forensic Mental Health 43rd annual conference. He presented on the addiction and mental health courts as well as all restorative justice efforts. He said, it was very exciting to have so

many people in the audience and interested in starting similar programs in their respective counties. Jonathan announced that there's a new judge (Dave) to replace Judge Guard. He explained that these systems require everyone to work together and it's a much happier place to be than regular court. Jonathan feels like all the partners are evolving together to get people through the system and diverted from incarceration. We want to add numbers to these programs because there are still gaps. On an anecdotal basis these programs are remarkable. James asked if Jonathon and Bret and keep their eyes out for a potential former participant to join the LMHB.

6. Nicki wanted to know more about the innovation and incubator. Karen let her know that there are couple possible programs to look at.

3. Future Meeting Planning and Adjournment – James Glica-Hernandez

- a. LRPC: Next meeting, 4/29 will include a presentation from HHS Deputy Director, Rebecca Mellott on the Agency's Budget.

The expense incurred when moving funds from a “savings” account to a “checking” account to use for operations.
- Other Financing Sources
The revenue received from funds moving from the “savings” account (“Fund Balance”) to the “checking” account to use for operations.
- Intrafund Transfers
Expense reimbursements where one program area incurred a cost on behalf of another program area.

Director's Report

April 29, 2019

Mental Health Awareness Month –Mental Health Awareness Month is right around the corner and HHSA has been busy planning. Upcoming events include the Consumers Art Show, a Family Carnival, multiple outings and much more! Attached you'll find a calendar of events for our community.

Suicide Prevention Crisis Line Sustainability- For the past several months Karen has been working with CalMHSA, Suicide Prevention Crisis Line, and a group of counties (Solano, Butte, Shasta, Humboldt, El Dorado, Nevada, Yuba) to establish a contract whereby other counties would pay into our local line based on their call volume from the prior year. All counties mentioned above have agreed to this methodology and our hope is to have the new arrangement begin July 1, 2019, at the start of the new fiscal year.

Pine Tree Gardens- On March 29th, Supervisors Saylor and Provenza, along with staff from HHSA and Turning Point met with concerned family members and citizens to discuss sustainability plans for Pine Tree Gardens. Attached you will find a draft sustainability plan that summarizes all strategies and sources of funding discussed to date. It should be noted that this is very much a working document and subject to Board approval. Please see attached draft.

Juvenile Detention Facility (JDF) Mental Health Services- Over the past few years the Probation Department has begun hiring mental health staff to provide services to youth in custody. Specifically, these staff have been hired to provide services for youth placed in our care by the Office of Refugee Resettlement. Over time, probation mental health staff have come to outnumber CFMG (WellPath) mental health staff. This has led to confusion of roles etc. As such, all parties have mutually agreed that effective July 1st, Probation Mental Health staff, with oversight provided by Karen Larsen and Dr. Robert Canning, will assume full responsibility for the mental health services for all youth in custody. WellPath will continue to provide physical healthcare and Psychiatry for the youth.

Addiction Intervention Court/Mental Health Court– KCRA3 is running an ongoing monthly special on important community issues called CommUNITY and on April 18th they featured Yolo County's Specialty Court programs, specifically an Addiction Intervention Court graduation ceremony and significant coverage on the Mental Health Court program. Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Learning Collaborative – Yolo County was one of 6 projects statewide to join Cohort 2 of an initiative to increase MAT services in custody and in drug courts, joining 22 other counties from Cohort 1. The purpose of the project is to bring together key community partners, increase understanding of MAT services, identify barriers and successes, and ultimately increase the availability of these services in and out of custody for those in need. Yolo County's team currently consists of representatives from HHSA, District Attorney, Public Defender, CAO, Courts, CommuniCare Health Centers, and the Sheriff

Department. The team hopes to add a representative from WellPath moving forward. Team members attended the first of 5 all-day in person sessions in Sacramento on April 23rd to build some basic knowledge, acknowledge first steps in the process, identify a time for a jail site visit from Health Management Agency who is coordinating the technical assistance, and setup monthly technical assistance calls. Yolo will have the opportunity to apply for \$100,000-\$300,000 at the end of this 12 month collaborative to implement some of the practices learned throughout the project.

Jail Based Competency Treatment – HHSA has worked with several community partners, District Attorney, Public Defender, Sheriff’s Department, WellPath, and County Counsel, on a concept for a Jail Based Competency Treatment program inside Yolo’s jail for up to 5 felony incompetent to stand trial (IST) clients at a time. The partners met earlier this month and agreed that entering into a contract with the Department of State Hospitals (DSH) for this program would be best once the jail reconstruction is further along. All parties will continue working on the contracting aspect with DSH to ensure a program launch as soon as possible when the jail is ready. Anticipated timeline is 18-24 months.

CBHDA Executive Director- After more than 9 months of recruitment the California Behavioral Health Directors Association has hired a new Executive Director, Michelle Cabrera. Please find attached press release. On April 19th, Ms. Cabrera came to Yolo County to learn about our successes, challenges and suggested legislative issues. We are proud to have a Yolo resident as the new ED for the association. Please see attached press release.

Board of Supervisors Workshops – As part of the County strategic planning process the Board of Supervisors have been receiving presentations from staff and community groups. On April 16th HHSA Staff presented on multiple topics including Health in all Policies, Health Equity and Adult and Aging Services. Health in All Policies and Health Equity were presented by the Community Health Branch and included Yolo County specific health information as well as recommendations to think “upstream” when making policy decisions to improve health outcomes for the community. The presentation on Adult and Aging Services provided up-to-date information on services provided by HHSA for older adults as well as recommendations on how to make Yolo County a more aging-friendly community. Alternative Facilities and the Continuum of Care for those Living with Serious Mental Illness: Addressing the Shrinking Safety Net of Licensed Residential Facilities- On April 11th, Karen joined the Steinberg Institute and Assemblymember Bloom, along with influential experts, for a special briefing exploring challenges facing our shrinking safety net of residential facilities. Adult Residential Facilities (ARF’s) are a critical component of California’s housing continuum and play a key role in preventing homelessness, incarceration, and recidivism. When people receive the care and support they need, they are less likely to find themselves in emergency departments and psychiatric facilities.

Audit Updates

External Quality Review Organization (EQRO) Report

We received the final report from the February 2019 Mental Health EQRO site audit, which is linked below. EQRO reviewers evaluated Yolo county’s performance regarding Access, Timeliness, and Quality of Care, as well as the functionality of our Health Information System, Avatar. We were found to have met or partially met 94% of the Key Components on which we were evaluated. Additionally, both Performance Improvement Projects (PIP) were well received. We successfully completed our Clinical PIP addressing transitions in care for adult clients in locked facilities, and we successfully implemented the Non-Clinical PIP, which addresses timely

access to adult mental health services The Non-Clinical PIP will continue into FY 19-20, and we will initiate a new Clinical PIP. Overall, the EQRO identified 15 specific recommendations for system improvement that staff will address throughout the coming year. Substance Use Disorder- External Quality Review Organization (SUD-EQRO) - The inaugural SUD EQRO review is scheduled for fall 2019; preparations will begin in June.

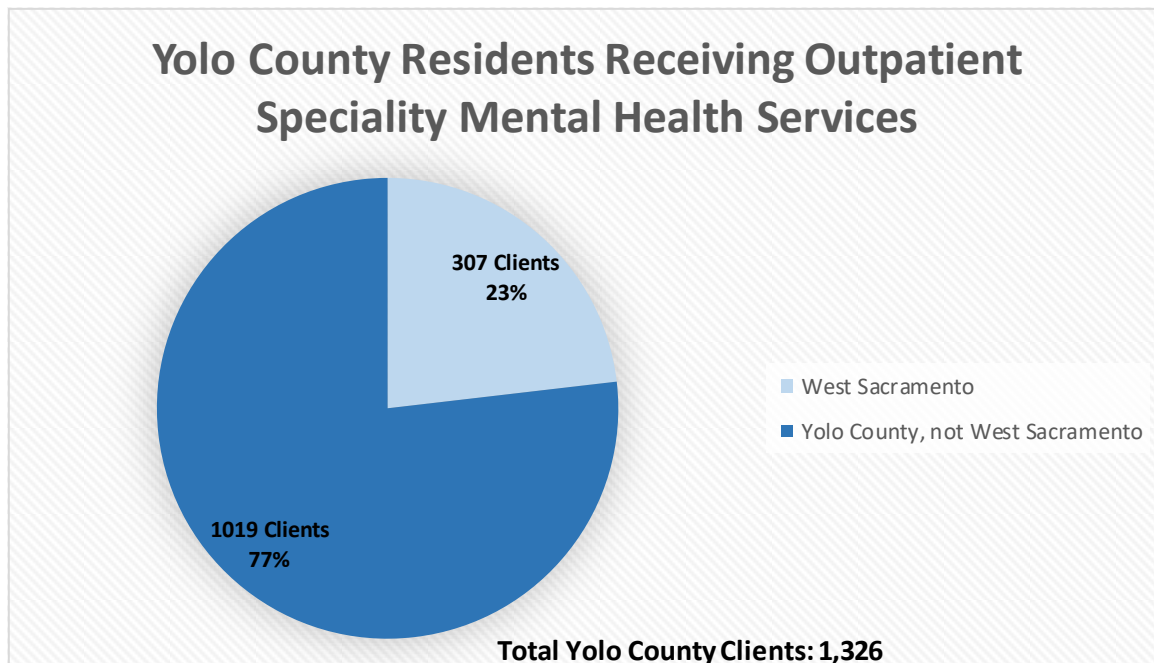

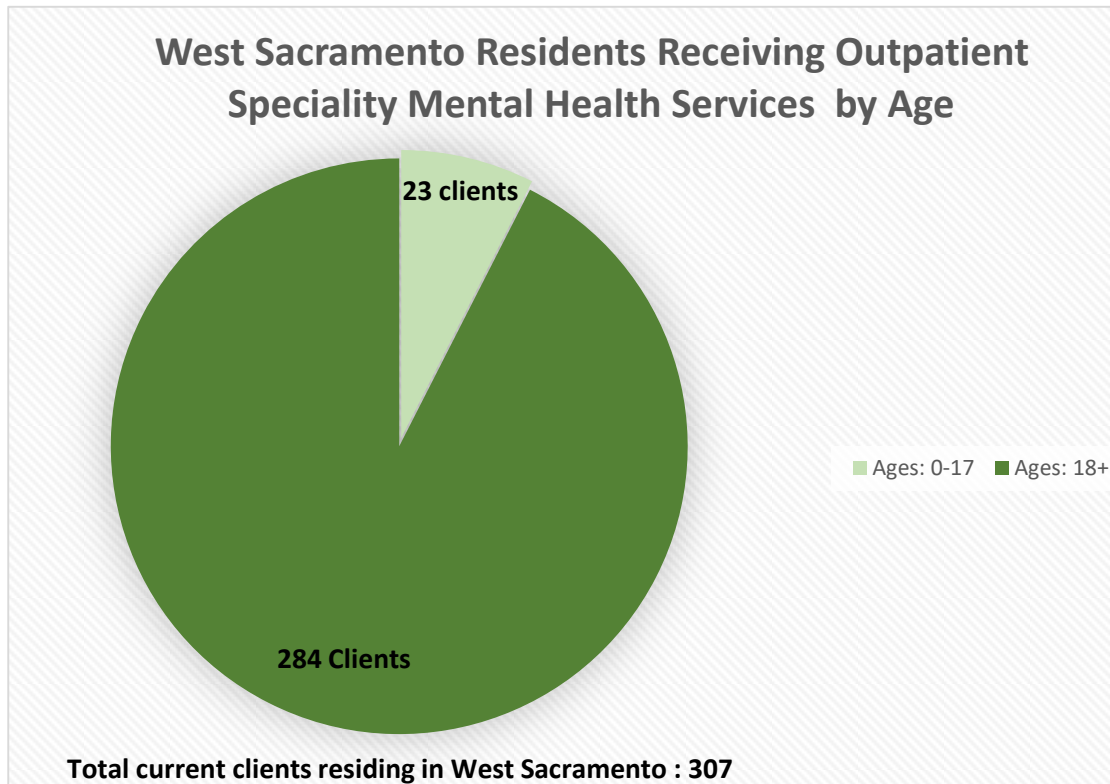

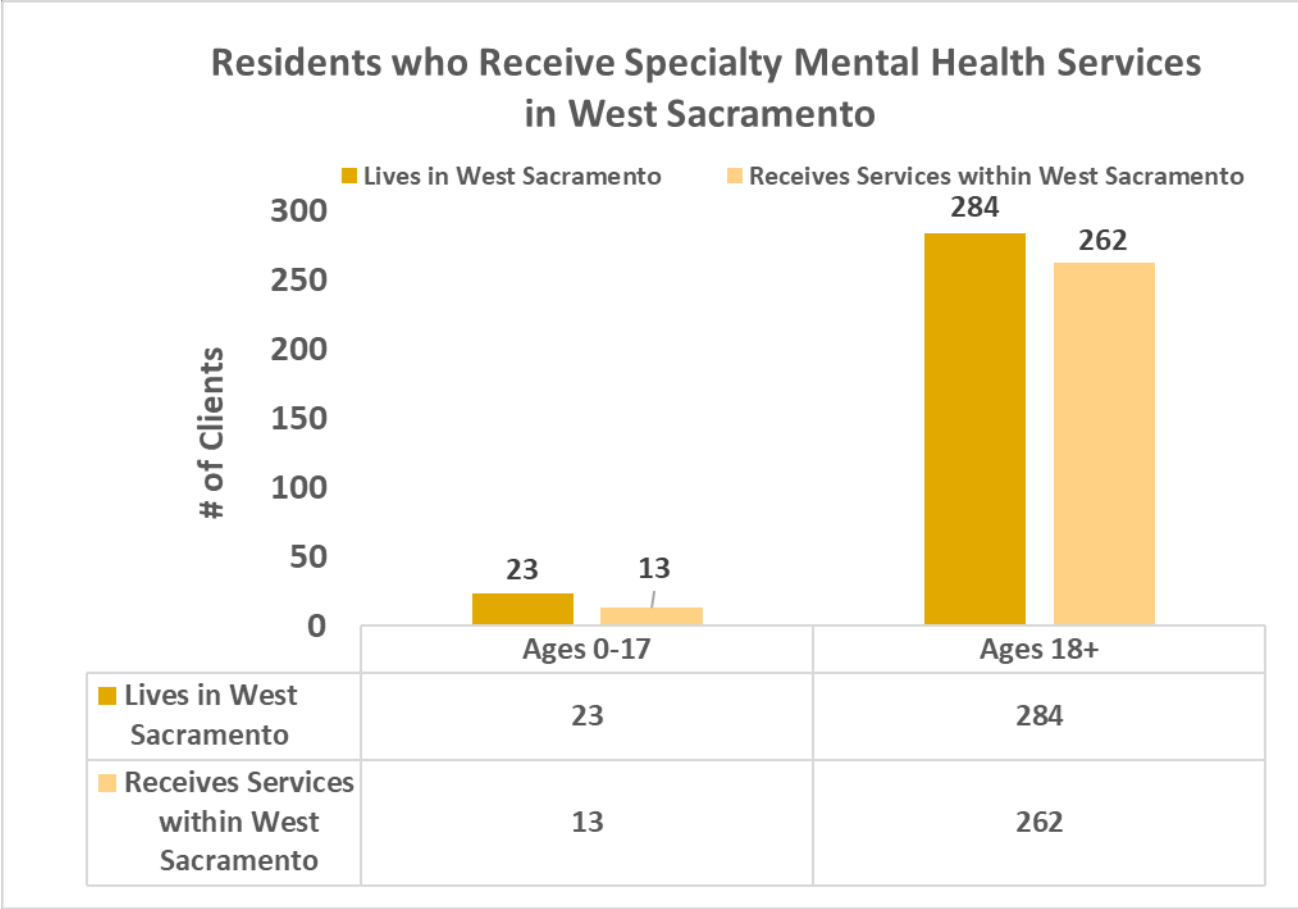
