3. INTRODUCTIONS AND PROGRAM UPDATES

Meeting attendees shared updates from their programs:

- Dan Sokolow, City of Woodland The Woodland City Council approved an MOU amendment to extend the 'Extended Shelter' to April 30, 2019.
- Larry Stark, Davis United Methodist is one of a group of about 12 individuals who are looking for volunteer opportunities to become more involved in the community, and is here today to learn about the programs that are already happening.
- Janis Holt, Yolo County Housing (YCH)
 - Thank you to HHSA staff (Ian, Elaine, Amanda) for working closely with YCH on the Family Unification Program (FUP) vouchers. YCH provided a training for HHSA staff to explain how the process will work. These will all be direct referrals from HHSA.
 - o Received 22 Mainstream Vouchers which are for non-elderly, ages 18 to 61 with a disabled household member (not required to be head of household), who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, institutionalized, or at risk of institutionalization. YCH sent continued interested letters to Section 8 waiting list and through that process, 63 responded and self-identified as being eligible for the Mainstream Voucher program. YCH will be sending them eligibility packets and asking them to provide verification of their housing status, so they may be asking housing providers for a letter documenting this. The next step is a limited opening of the wait list, specifically for the population that meets the above criteria.
- James McCleod, Yolo Community Care Continuum They are still working on filling their one vacancy for PSH.
- Elaine Lytle, Yolo County HHSA Their CalWORKs Housing Support Program received a \$118,674 supplement for this fiscal year.
- Niomi Michel, Empower Yolo They are currently out of funding for Rapid Re-Housing, but hope to be receiving more soon.
- Doug Zeck, Fourth and Hope –



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- They were not awarded funding through ESG for their Street Outreach nor Emergency Shelter programs. Fortunately, they did receive CESH funds which will help fund the shelter program.
- Through partnership with the District Attorney's Office and Office of Emergency Services, they
 were awarded a grant for transitional housing which will house up to 24 people who have been a
 victim of crime.
- Hired a new Program Manager for their treatment program; started Monday.
- Martha Teeter, Davis Opportunity Village In the process of organizing a homelessness summit to ask the
 City Council to receive community input on goals for a 2019 homelessness plan for Davis. They are also
 thinking about submitting an application for No Place Like Home.
- Linda Scott, Interfaith Rotating Winter Shelter Davis Closed for the season on March 17th; Served fewer unique individuals this year, but they stayed about the same number of nights as in previous seasons.
- Alyssa Meyer, Legal Services of Northern California –Fair Housing Conference is April 9, 2019. Reached
 capacity 48 hours after registration opened. They are hoping to open up more spaces, so if anyone was
 unable to register, email Alyssa and she is keeping a waiting list. The State Director of Fair Housing is
 speaking at the conference.
- Michele Kellogg, Yolo Community Care Continuum
 - Starting partnership with the City of Woodland for a pilot program to have homeless individuals helping to clean up the city parks. Pilot will go until the end of June at which time they will evaluate the program.
 - Using a planning grant to partner with HomeBase to provide technical assistance to individual providers who offer supportive housing through CoC funding from HUD. These meetings will start occurring in July 2019.
- Sheila Allen, Yolo Healthy Aging Alliance They are an advocacy group for older adults.
 - Planning a housing summit in the Fall that will focus on different models for older adults that are affordable and accessible.
 - SSI recipients will soon be eligible to receive CalFresh. Enrollment starts May 1st and the program starts June 1st.
 - o Annual fundraiser is April 7th. She has flyers available for anyone interested.
- Amber Whitaker, City of West Sacramento Their 2019 CDBG action plan is available for comment and review. It is available on their website, at the Yolo County Library in West Sacramento and at City Hall. Email Amber with any questions.
- Patrick Vancuren, Veteran's Resource Center Yolo County will be transferred to the Sacramento VRC. For
 now, referrals can be sent to Patrick and he will pass it on to the new representative who should be at the
 next meeting. He requested a copy of everyone's card so he can pass them on to the new representative.
- Erin McEwen, Yolo County Children's Alliance They are coordinating a homeless resource fair on Saturday, April 27th from 10 AM to 1 PM at the West Sacramento HHSA building. Many community members will be present and the following will be offered: hot lunch, phone sign up, hygiene bags, bike rack with cat and dog food, BINGO, arts & crafts, books, phone chargers, and clothing. Agencies wishing to sign up for a resource table were invited to sign up. Flyer will be distributed through the HPAC email distribution list.
- Zane Hatfield, Yolo Food Bank they moved into their new facility, and are looking to expand their distribution by 50% over the next two years, and also to expand their partnerships with other agencies for food distribution.
- Ryan Collins, City of Davis At a recent City Council meeting, Mayor Lee requested a workgroup to develop
 a pilot program called Respite Center which would provide an onsite service center located on city land to
 address the lack of no barrier or low barrier shelter in Davis. A report will be prepared for the City Council



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by the end of April. The initial target date for implementation is June 1st, or as soon as possible. The site could serve as a meeting location for partner agencies and clients.

Nadia Waggener – The HHSA homeless services team has some new team members including a clinician
and two case manager. Nadia is working on onboarding them and will be asking partner agencies if they
can do a site visit and/or job shadow to learn more about what your agency offers, how her team can
partner with you, and to learn more about the resources available in Yolo County.

4. APPROVE ROI CHANGES

Emily Meza, Yolo County HHSA explained that the requested change is in regards to the Release of Information for HMIS. Sacramento HMIS researched other CoCs and learned that the most commonly used period of eligibility is 7 years. Sacramento County has adopted this, changing the period from 5 years to 7 years. This change was reviewed by the Data Subcommittee and their recommendation is for HPAC to adopt this. It was discussed by HPAC at the January meeting, but not voted on because it was not called out as an action item on the agenda. There were also some functionality changes in HMIS to require users to upload the ROI to the correct location at the time the client is being entered in HMIS. There is also a prompt for existing clients if the ROI is missing. In most cases, the ROI is completed but not uploaded into he appropriate location in HMIS.

Questions:

- 1. Is there a place on the form where the client could indicate that they wanted to time period to be shorter than 7 years? Not currently, but the ROI can be revoked by the client at any time.
- 2. Are CoC agencies are required to use HMIS? This is not currently required by HPAC policy and procedure, but some of the grants do require HMIS usage. There have been four new agencies added to HMIS during the last year. Ryan Collins, HPAC Chair, commented that in general everyone agrees that HMIS makes it easier for all the partner agencies to work together, however the concern historically is that it requires work for maintenance and upkeep of HMIS records and could be burdensome if an agency doesn't have the capacity for this and doesn't have a funding source that is mandating it. If HPAC requires this in their policy and procedures it would essentially create an unfunded mandate that could then become a barrier to a program participating in HPAC. In principle it is the right direction to go in, but HPAC wants to be sensitive to these concerns.
- 3. Can an HMIS license be shared? No two agencies could enter into an MOU to partner but multiple users cannot use the same license. These questions can be further discussed in the Data Subcommittee in order to make HMIS more available and useful for all HPAC agencies.
- 4. When HHSA sends out the updated ROI can you include a cover sheet with instructions about how and where to upload it in HMIS? Yes
- 5. Will a report could be provided to show which clients are currently missing an ROI in HMIS? Yes, Sacramento Steps Forward is planning to provide this.

ACTION ITEM: Approve Change in ROI Period from 5 to 7 years: HPAC unanimously approved the Data Subcommittee's recommendation to expand the length of time of the ROI from 5 years to 7 years.

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5. POINT-IN-TIME (PIT) COUNT UPDATE

Ian Evans, Yolo County HHSA acknowledged that there have been many requests received for PIT County data. 95% of the surveys were completed on paper this year so there was a significant effort to input these. HHSA is looking at ways to make future use of the online survey more user friendly, have the data available more quickly and with less workload involved.

At the January meeting the PIT County Community Leads verbally shared their unofficial counts. These are the only numbers that have been shared thus far. Any questions about these numbers or the methodology used can be directed individually to the Community Leads for the appropriate community.

Suggestion to have a 'post mortem' conversation to discuss methodologies used and share best practices. Ian invited the Community Leads to submit a written summary of their methodology used so that HHSA can include this in the local PIT Count report. They will first check the January minutes and see if additional information is needed.

Data must be submitted to HUD by 4/30/19, so by then we will be able to share the overall PIT count data. The comprehensive local report with additional demographic/characteristic data will follow as soon as possible.

6. HUD DATA SUBMISSION DEADLINES

Emily Meza, Yolo County HHSA provided the following information:

- PIT Count Measures individuals that are living homeless. The data required by HUD will be entered by 4/30/19, but the report issued to the local community is more extensive and requires additional effort. The Data Subcommittee is April 17th and HHSA hopes to share the data with them then. If it is not ready by then, it will be shared by email during the last week of April prior to submission to HUD.
- HIC Count Measures the number of permanent, emergency and transitional housing units that are
 available in the community. The Sheltered PIT count total must match the HIC Count total. The data is
 due to HUD by 4/30/19. Emily will be reaching out to providers as needed to verify data.
- System Performance Measures Report This is related to data quality and is due to HUD by the end of May. Emily or Lindsay from Sacramento Steps Forward will be reaching out to providers as needed for information.
- Longitudinal System Analysis (LSA), previously referred to as the AHAR data report. The LSA was
 completed for the first time last year and we are now in the review stage with HUD. A representative has
 been assigned and they have flagged data that needs to be reviewed. Emily or Lindsay from Sacramento
 Steps Forward will be reaching out to providers as needed for information.

7. HPAC LETTER OF SUPPORT POLICY

Ryan Collins, HPAC Chair, explained that HPAC has periodically received requests as a Continuum for letters of support which are often needed as part of a grant application. HPAC doesn't currently have standard criteria, or a policy or procedure that addresses this. It would be helpful to establish this so that HPAC can respond more timely and consistently when these requests are received. Suggested considerations include participation in HPAC,



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mission alignment with HPAC, program relevance to homelessness and any disqualifying factors (i.e. political). Request for HPAC to explore this further in the next HPAC Technical meeting. The goal is to develop standard criteria, make a recommendation to HPAC for approval for the policy and then apply it whenever a letter of support is requested, allowing for a timely response without further discussion with HPAC at each request. Request for HPAC's involvement in an MOU would be handled separately from this. Once finalized, the policy would be published and easily available to the public.

8. HHSA STAFFING UPDATES

lan Evans, Yolo County HHSA, shared that the new organizational chart for HHSA Homeless Services is included in the agenda packet. Once the recently hired staff are trained, the goal is to develop a one-page flyer that explains the target population, the types of services they can receive and how referrals can come to the team. When developed, this will be shared with HPAC.

Sandra Sigrist, Yolo County HHSA, added that the coordination of services will be key and she appreciates giving the team time to learn about all of the resources and partner agencies to ensure that effort is not being duplicated. Each city now has homeless coordinators with office hours and the HHSA staff will likely be involved with those.

9. GRANTS UPDATES

Ian Evans, Yolo County HHSA, shared the following updates:

- Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) -
 - O HHSA executed the contract with Business Consumer Service and Housing agency (BCSH).
 - O Contracts for sub-recipients are in progress.
 - O All funds were awarded in Round 1, so there will not be a Round 2 for HEAP.
- No Place Like Home (NPLH)
 - O Round 1
 - Two project applications (City of West Sacramento and City of Woodland) for Round 1 were submitted to HCD 1/29/19.
 - HCD confirmed that both passed threshold review and provided official scores to the project contacts including any score adjustments.
 - HCD posted the self-scores for all projects online.
 - Based on the information posted by HCD, the total amount requested by the medium counties was less than the amount available. Possible reasons for not applying include the difficulty and complexity of the application and the additional funding that needs to be raised beyond the maximum NPLH loan amount.
 - Yolo County Housing was able to award 75 project based vouchers total to the Woodland and West Sacramento projects combined.
 - Award notification is not anticipated until June 2019 but each applicant has been contacted by HCD and is going through a feasibility review with their assigned representative.
 - O Round 2
 - NOFA is expected in September 2019.



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- Davis is considering a NPLH Round 2 application. Due to the limited Full Service Partnership slots available in the county, and those already taken by the Round 1 applications (71 slots), anyone interested in a NPLH Round 2 application should discuss this with HHSA as soon as possible.
- Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)
 - O 2018 award letters were recently sent out. The federal government shutdown caused some delays.
 - O 2019 ESG Selection Process and Notice of Funding was sent out March 18th.
 - Mandatory notice of intent due April 1st.
 - Final application due date to the state is unknown but we are targeting May 15th.
 - We won't know if there will be a local competition until we receive the notices of intent on April 1st. We are allowed to submit 2 Competitive project applications and 1 Non-Competitive project application. If more than that are received, then a local competition will be needed.
 - Refer to the Selection Process for additional details.
- Continuum of Care (CoC) -
 - O 2018
 - awards announced by HUD
 - HPAC submitted 7 projects total, including 2 bonus projects. The 5 renewal projects were approved with small increases from the previous year's amount. The 2 bonus projects were not approved.
 - Email was sent to HPAC March 14th with additional details.
 - Providers should be receiving their contract directly from HUD.
 - 0 2019
 - NOFA is expected by May 1st.
 - HHSA completed the required registration in e-Snaps by March 14th.
- Housing for a Healthy CA
 - NOFA from HCD expected Spring 2019.
- FFSP
 - \$107,008 allocation is available.
 - 7 Yolo providers expressed interest in applying collaboratively.
 - o They met in early March to discuss and agree on percentages to divide the funds between them.
 - o Providers submitted applications directly to the Sacramento Region EFSP Board.
 - The applications will be scored in April.
- Proposition 47 Round 2
 - O Round 1 funded the Steps to Success program which received \$6 million over a 36-month period to serve individuals who have mental health and/or substance use issues, and are involved in the criminal justice system.
 - O In Round 2, over \$100M is available statewide and Round 1 recipients are eligible to apply.
 - O Yolo submitted application March 18th in partnership with the District Attorney's Office, Public Defender and Probation.



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- Awards will be made by June with the start of the project in August, with about a 4 month ramp up period to get staff and contracts in place, with services starting January 2010. There will be a 36-month period of services with 4 months of evaluation at the end.
- O The Round 2 application focuses on individuals meeting the above criteria who are living homeless.
- O Thank you to all who participated in the public input sessions as this is a key part of the application.
- California Emergency Solutions & Housing (CESH) 2018 Round 1
 - Award letter received.
 - O Awaiting standard agreement. HCD indicated yesterday that we should expect to receive within 60 days.
 - When standard agreement received from Housing and Community Development (HCD), HHSA will work with them to:
 - Adjust the funding levels between projects to match the outcome of our local selection process.
 - Adjust the performance measures based on adjusted funding levels for each project.
 - This is necessary because the CESH application was due prior to the local selection process occurring.

10. CALIFORNIA EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS AND HOUSING PROGRAM (CESH) 2019 ROUND 2

The NOFA for CESH Round 2 was released and the application is due to the state by May 6th. The criteria and eligible uses are the same as they were in Round 1. Because of the quick turnaround time, HHSA has drafted two options for the Local Selection Timeline:

- Option A is a quicker turnaround and would complete the process prior to HHSA submitting the application
 to the state. The benefit of this is that it would avoid the need to request approval for an amendment as
 we are having to do for CESH Round 1. This would result in the money being distributed to providers sooner.
 It would also align with the ESG timeline. If this option is chosen, a special HPAC General meeting would be
 scheduled for this date to vote on the recommendation of the Selection Subcommittee.
- Option B allows more time but would require HHSA to submit the application to HCD with estimates for the types of projects and amount of funding for each type of activity, and estimated performance measures. This would require approval of an amendment after receiving the standard agreement, as needed for CESH Round 1.

Question: One of the criteria for selection is the need for funds based on the PIT Count. Would it be possible to ensure that the Selection Subcommittee has access to the 2019 PIT Count data (basic number breakdown, not full report) so that we are using the most recent PIT Count Data available? Yes

Similarly, CESH requires counties to submit a County Homelessness Plan. When we applied for CESH Round 1, we submitted the Strategic Plan to End Homelessness that was revised in 2017. Now we have the County Plan Addressing Homelessness that was developed as part of the No Place Like Home requirements. This is the plan that will be submitted with CESH Round 2. HPAC requested that this plan be sent out to HPAC again.

2. INTRODUCTIONS AND PROGRAM UPDATES



May 1st, 2019 Meeting Minutes

Meeting attendees shared updates from their programs:

- Martha Teeter, Davis Opportunity Village DOV is hosting a homelessness summit to ask the City Council to receive community input on goals for a 2019 homelessness plan for Davis, the date is May 22nd.
- Koy Saechao, Turning Point Cool Beans coffee cart is hiring for a barista, passed around a flyer, HHSA to distribute via HPAC mailing list.
- Mary Anne Kirsch, Interfaith Rotating Winter Shelter of Davis (IRWS) IRWS completed their season with 2200 instances of service for the 2018-2019 season and they are currently preparing their ESG application.
- Sandra Sigrist, Yolo County HHSA has returned from a month away, HHSA submitted a grant application for Prop 47 Round 2 and expect a response by early June. The County submitted a CHFFA grant for \$1 million to purchase 2 houses that will house 5 individuals in each house as a joint project with HHSA and the DA's office.
- Dan Maguire, City of Winters worked with County and Yolo Food Bank regarding food insecurity in Winters. Food Distributions in Woodland will now occur weekly.
- Zane Hatfield, Yolo Food Bank YFB has been meeting with localities to evaluate need for increased distributions. They were holding an event on the Big Day of Giving and Farm Fresh to You will donate \$5 to YFB just for sharing a specific Facebook post.
- Erin McEwen, Yolo County Children's Alliance the Homeless Resource Fair in West Sacramento went well, 193 meals were given out, 130 hygiene bags, and there were various providers/resources present.

3. FY 2019 EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT (ESG)

Emily Meza, Yolo County HHSA briefly explained the background and purpose of the ESG grant, and explained that HPAC now needed approve which projects would be recommended for funding to the State of California. There are two funding allocations potentially available to CoC's every year.

- 1. **Non-Competitive Allocation** limited to primarily rapid re-housing projects, and 2 applications total per CoC
- 2. **Competitive Allocation** primary eligible uses include: Emergency Shelter, Street Outreach, Rapid Rehousing, limited to 2 applications total per CoC

HPAC considered the Notices of Intent from the following organizations:

Discussion:

1. Doug Zeck from Fourth & Hope, explained that they were not awarded funds in the 2018 ESG funding round as they had previously for neither Emergency Shelter nor Street Outreach programs. He explained that they had an exit interview with the State of California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and learned where their application where could be more competitive. They learned



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that the ESG competition is very important and favors projects that have high rates of successful placement in permanent housing.

- 2. Joan Planell stated that she is going to make an official statement to HCD regarding how inappropriate it is to evaluate Emergency Shelter programs on permanent housing placement when the purpose of emergency shelter is to meet an individual's immediate need for safe shelter.
- 3. Michele Kellogg spoke to Empower Yolo's Rapid Re-housing project and stated that Empower Yolo has been awarded this funding in past years, though in the 2018-2019 year they ran out of funds 6 months ago. They have a good success rate and this program meets a very important need in the community as it provides both Rapid Re-Housing and Homeless Prevention funds.
- 4. Alysa Meyer spoke about the challenges of extremely low rental vacancy rates in our community, Woodland's was at 0.8%, Davis at 0.5%, and West Sacramento at 2-3%. For these reasons, Homeless Prevention is key as there are so few options for people once they lose their housing.
- 5. Jeneba Lahai agreed with Alysa Meyer's statements and suggested that HPAC begin regularly hearing from case managers about the situation "on the ground". She also expressed concern that West Sacramento was not represented in the applications.
- 6. Ryan Collins spoke about how the County Homeless Plan centered Homeless Prevention as a pressing need and that he supports advocacy with HCD regarding ESG scoring.

NOTES ON FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS

The Subcommittee evaluated the projects for funding based on a variety of factors, including: score, whether similar activities were proposed by more than one agency, community need, and amount of original request.

- Resources for Independent Living (RIL) scored the lowest and was eliminated based on the low score and the very limited funding.
- Fourth & Hope scored highest and also was considered to represent the greatest need in the community as this proposal will fund the only year-round emergency shelter. As such, the subcommittee recommended the highest portion of funds to this proposal.
- The Mercy Housing and Yolo County Children's Alliance proposals were complementary in that
 each supported a different component of a joint project. Therefore, the subcommittee felt one
 proposal could not be funded without another. The subcommittee decided to partially fund
 both proposals and recognized significant need in West Sacramento for housing related services.
- The CommuniCare proposal for the Street Medicine Program was seen as innovative and meeting a need in the community, however, it was the most expensive proposal and received the second lowest score. Also, the proposal was for outreach services which were not prioritized as highly as housing.
- Yolo Community Care Continuum was recognized as providing quality service within their scope of work, received the second highest score, and provides housing.









Long-Term Homeless (% of all homeless persons)






At Least 1 Health Issue


POTENTIAL BARRIERS TO HOUSING







BACKGROUND AND AFTER-ACTION REPORT

BACKGROUND

The Yolo County Homeless and Poverty Action Coalition conducted its 2019 Homeless Count on January 22, 2019. The Homeless Count, also known as the Point-in-Time Count, is a survey of individuals and families identified as experiencing sheltered or unsheltered homelessness within the boundaries of Yolo County on a single night in January.

Reason for Conducting the Count

The U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires all communities that receive grant funding from HUD for addressing homelessness to conduct an annual count of people experiencing sheltered homelessness and a biannual count of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness. 2019 was a year in which HUD requires both a sheltered and unsheltered count.

In addition to allowing the community to secure grant funding from HUD, the count data can be used when applying for funding from other funders, provides detailed information on the demographics and needs of people experiencing homelessness in Yolo, and allows homeless service providers in Yolo to target their services to meet the specific needs of those they serve.

Scheduling the Count

HUD requires that all communities conduct the count on a single night during the last ten days of January, to allow for consistency in comparing count data across communities. Each community may select the date of the count, within the tenday timeframe.

Definition of Homelessness

HUD has developed a definition of homelessness that guides our count activities, as follows:

A person is considered homeless only when he or she is:

- living in places not meant for human habitation, or
- living in an emergency shelter, or
- living in transitional housing for the homeless but originally came from the streets or an emergency shelter, or
- staying in a motel paid for by a public or private agency because the person or family is homeless.

Anyone who does not meet this definition cannot be included in the count data that is reported to HUD.

Limitations of the Count

When considering the numbers in the count it is important to recognize that they reflect only those persons identified as homeless within the county on a single day. Many people move in and out of homelessness during the course of a year, meaning that the actual number of people experiencing homeless in 2019 may be much higher than the numbers included in this report.


Additionally, the count does not include people who are doubled up in conventional housing; people who are couch surfing; adults living in a mental health facility, chemical dependency facility, criminal justice facility, or permanent supportive housing; or youth living in residential treatment facilities, emergency foster care, or detention facilities. People living in these circumstances do not meet the HUD definition of homelessness, and therefore, cannot be included in the count.

AFTER-ACTION REPORT

Homeless Count Subcommittee and Organizational Structure

The 2019 Homeless Count Subcommittee convened for the first time in October 2018 to begin preparing for the count. In total, the Planning Group met four times before the count. In April 2019, the HPAC Data Subcommittee met to review the collected data before preparing the official report to HUD. The group included representatives from all four major Cities, several County programs, and numerous local homeless service providers. The flow chart below features this year's count organizational structure.

The Lead in each community was responsible for local volunteer recruitment and training, coordinating activities on the day of the count, and distributing any incentives that were available to count participants. Each Lead developed a plan for implementation of the count in their community, and shared with the larger Planning Group at their final meeting before the count.



Successes

- Planning process was inclusionary and collaborative.
- The thorough group review of the survey resulted in the elimination and/or simplification of questions. Also resulted in the collection of more relevant and meaningful data.
- Appointing Community Leads allowed the local experts to develop a count plan that made sense for the unique needs of each area.

• Several communities relied on local resources and donations to offer incentives. For example, one community offered food to encourage participants to complete the survey.

Challenges

- Some key stakeholders did not participate in the count planning process, including some homeless service
 providers, school district representatives, library staff, and current and/or formerly homeless persons.
- Despite convening the Planning Group in October 2018, the process still seemed rushed.
- Lack of dedicated and/or communitywide funding for count activities.

Recommended Improvements

- Ensure broad participation from the beginning by reaching out to key stakeholders in advance of the first meeting, with a focused effort on ensuring that all agencies who offer homeless service projects are included.
- If Community Lead organizational structure is the model for the next count, consider earlier recruitment and identification of a Winters and rural Community Lead.
- If Community Lead organizational structure is the model for the next count, collect plans from Community Leads at least one month in advance of the count.
- Finalize and release survey at least one month in advance of the count.
- Apply for grants or other funding to provide count-specific financial support including money for purchasing count incentives.

Count Date and Methodology

HUD requires that the count occur on one night within the last ten calendar days in January. Yolo County selected the count date of Monday, January 22, 2019.

While HPAC conducted the majority of count activities on the morning of January 23rd, additional count activities occurred over the course of the seven days following the night of Monday, January 22rd. This approach, known as a post-night count, allows enumerators several days to ensure a complete canvassing of the community. The majority of individuals counted in this way were those who had been sheltered in Emergency Shelter or Transitional Housing on the night of January 22, 2019. The one potential drawback to the "post-night count" approach is that it increases the chances of double counting. In an effort to avoid double counting, enumerators collected the initials as well as birth month and year of each participant. While not personally identifying, the information helps to flag any potential duplicates post-count.

In terms of methodology, HPAC used a mixed-methods approach consisting of the following:

- Complete census count
 - In this approach, teams of enumerators canvassed Yolo County's entire geography and searched for persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness.
- Known location count
 - This approach identified locations where there were known encampments and sent enumerators there.
- Service-based count
 - This approach placed enumerators at social service centers and other locations where persons experiencing homelessness may access assistance.

Successes

• Usage of the "post-night count" methodology, proved effective in identifying additional persons experiencing homelessness on the count date.

Challenges

Since one specific day for each community was not set (as had been done in 2015), most communities
conducted their major activities on the same day. This decreased the pool of trained staff that could have
assisted in multiple communities.

Recommended Improvements

- Continue with usage of "post-night count" methodology.
- Discuss the benefits and drawbacks of staggering the major activities within communities by designating set days.

Survey Forms and Data

As in 2017, HPAC utilized three different survey forms:

- 1. For those experiencing sheltered homelessness
- 2. For those experiencing unsheltered homelessness
- 3. For those that were visually counted, but not surveyed

Enumerators had the option of using paper surveys or electronic surveys on a tablet to conduct the count.

Once all surveying was complete, County staff entered all paper surveys into the electronic survey system, exported the data and combined it with surveys completed electronically. Staff also completed all data clean up and coding. Next, County staff analyzed the data, created the count report, and reported the required numbers to HUD. The reports required by HUD were reviewed by HPAC prior to submission.

Successes

- Survey forms worked well and included easy-to-follow directions and relevant questions.
- Collecting the initials as well as birth month and year served as an important cross reference for deduplication purposes.

Challenges

- Data collation and coding was tedious and cumbersome.
- Not many enumerators utilized the electronic survey form.
- Despite much of the survey information being available in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) database, all shelter service providers still chose to complete individual surveys. This may affect data quality and is more time intensive.

Recommended Improvements

- Continue collecting the initials as well as birth month and year to assist with de-duplication efforts.
- Explore more technologically advanced options for collecting survey data to minimize administrative burden.
- Provide more hands-on training to shelter providers to help them prepare for the count and fully utilize the data contained in the HMIS rather than individual surveys.

Communications and Training

Given the recommendations from the 2017 count, HPAC decided to once again convene a Communications and Training Subcommittee. The Subcommittee's primary charges were to:

- Ensure consistent messaging among providers and enumerators about the count purpose and expressing needs for assistance.
- Create a resource that assists in training volunteers, while still allowing individual communities the autonomy to design and implement training based on unique needs of the region.
- Convene at least one "train the trainer" session to ensure better data quality and consistency among communities.

Successes

 Following recommendations from the 2017 count report, a "train the trainer" session was held to ensure better data quality and consistency among communities. Community Leads and volunteers attended this training.

Challenges

- Despite the countywide training session, the level of training still differed among communities, which may have affected the quality of data collection. For example, one community was unable to attend the countywide training and offered a training in advance of its count day.
- While the "train the trainer" session was effective for training volunteers on how to survey individuals
 encountered during the count, Community Leads lacked a strategy session for how activities would be
 implemented "on the ground".

Recommended Improvements

- Continue to have early discussions about communication and training needs.
 - As opposed to other communities who publicize their counts and seek community involvement, Yolo has historically chosen not to advertise its count and relied more on trained staff than volunteers. This is largely because Yolo's geographic area is small enough to be thoroughly canvassed by already existing staff, but also because Yolo lacks the bandwidth to provide sufficient volunteer training and management. Despite this, it is important to revisit this discussion for every count and understand the tradeoffs involved with these decisions.
- Continue to hold "train the trainer" sessions and ensure that all Community Leads are able to participate.
 - Encourage Community Leads to establish leadership and delineate tasks early on in the planning process.
- Hold an "on the ground" strategy session for Community Leads to discuss their plans for implementing the count activities in the field, and establish clear methods for communication on the day of the count.
