8:30 A.M. CALL TO ORDER

- WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS Carolyn Campos, Chair The June 21, 2019 MCAH Advisory Board meeting was called to order at 8:40 a.m., at which time around the table introductions occurred and quorum was confirmed.
- 2. CONSIDER APPROVAL OF AGENDA Carolyn Campos, Chair Quorum was not met.
- **3.** APPROVE THE SEPTEMBER 18, 2019 MINUTES Carolyn Campos, Chair Quorum was not met.
- 4. PUBLIC COMMENT
 - **Nicole Mion**: Shared that starting next month Help Me Grow will start play groups and parent support groups this is funded by First 5 and they are currently looking for people to join these groups.
 - Margret Walter: Senate Bill 24 was signed by the Governor. This requires all UC and CSUS to provide medical abortions on campus by January 2023.

5. COMMUNITY HEALTH BRANCH REPORT – Anna Sutton, DPHN

- MediCal/CMSP: There has be a slight increase in MediCal enrollment in the past month. If you have any questions/or access issues to MediCal please let Carolyn, Gaby or Anna know. MediCal staff also process CalFresh. There was over 1900 applications last month for CalFresh. The Services Center has started implementing a pilot program to have higher clerical staff answer calls as a triage to see if the call needs to be forwarded to an eligibility worker. The wait time since this team has started is a little over 8 minutes, they are able to handle 8% of the calls coming in without having to transfer the call to an eligibility worker. If the call is transitioned to an eligibility worker the wait time is around 25 minutes.
- EMS: They are preparing for drills.
- **MCAH:** Held its 4th Annual Community Baby Shower. Attendance was higher than last year. A remembrance ceremony was also held on October 6th for Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness month.
- **Budget:** Community Health Branch budget went to the Board and was approved for the realignment funds.
- **Syphilis Work Group:** CDC has released that STD's are at an all-time high; this is something that we are continuing to monitor. Yolo County has a Syphilis Work Group for pregnant mothers and babies. We should be receiving rapid syphilis testing gets. These were purchased with a small grant from CMSP.
- **SB276: Immunizations: medical exemptions:** It is likely this will be on the ballet. The state approved this group to gather signatures to recall SB276 and putting it on the ballot in November.

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AB 845: Continuing education: physicians and surgeons: maternal mental health: This law requires all hospitals to
provide maternal mental health education to its Doctors, Nurses, and Social Workers. This will go in affect January 1,
2020. They will also need to provide community resources for maternal mental health. This is an unfunded mandate for
hospitals.

6. FOLLOW UP ITEMS FROM PREVIOUS MEETING - Anna Sutton, DPHN & Carolyn Campos, Chair

- We would really like to have representation here from all the Social determinants of health
- We have drafted invitations for the Food Bank and local housing authority
- If anyone has any suggestions of a someone from local business or academic/economic sector that we can invite; we will draft the invitation for them to bring them on board so they can advise us as to how we work with the business community
- Help Me grow would like to screen those kids who don't become a substantiated case in order provide parental support and education; to keep them from becoming a substantiated case
- The group would like more information from Child Welfare regarding:
 - o the zip codes of where these cases are; who these kids are, are they siblings?
 - The cases that come in but a case is never opened/substantiated
 - How the decision making/criteria process is for county and the state for how they determine if a case is substantiated or unsubstantiated
 - How they track their data of calls reporting what people saw
 - For the adolescent age group what substantiates these cases
 - o What protective factors and resources were identified
- The Board asked from the annual report a heat mapping of STD prevalence in our county; particularly for 15-25yo, if there were certain geographic areas and if between that age group where the concentration of rising rates of STD's lie

• Social & Community:

- o Change in law
- o Advertising/billboards
- o Most leaders support vaccination
- Ease of obtaining vaccinations
- Positive culture of pro-vaccination
- Consistent messaging and quality of care
- Neighborhoods & Community:
 - Safety standards for licensure (childcare)
 - o Small geography and population
 - o Dedicated IZ program/coordinator with small geography
 - Lots of community spaces for moms/caregivers for parents to gather to share info (parks, safe places to play, libraries)

• Education:

- o "Herd immunity" awareness
- o Campaigns around tdap
- o Enrolled in licensed daycare

• Economic Stability:

- Vaccines are mostly free/affordability
- Large number of resources for vaccines/choices
- Health & Healthcare:
 - Provider targeted education
 - Standardized protocols (i.e. egg allergies)
 - o Large number of resources/options- CHOICE

- High rate of insurance for kids
- o Standardized well child visits connected to IZ schedule
- Ease of obtaining vaccine
- Follow up is done to ensure vaccines schedules are completed
- More effort to cluster well child/IZs
- Parking Lot:
 - o Targeted outreach
 - o Timely IZ for 0-3
 - o QI: Coordination of resources, linkage
 - o Including dads/partners in discussion (i.e. LA Campaign) culturally relevant representation
 - Because there is so much structural supports in place, there is very little need for education and individual behavior change (Group 3)

8. APPRECIATIVE INQUIRY: WHAT HAS WORKED IN YOLO COUNTY: SCHOOL AGED KIDS (5-14YO) – Carolyn Campos, Chair HANDOUT:

• Social & Community:

- o Social media amongst teens is very provax
- TV ads for HPV acceptance
- Vaccines are normalized (culture)
- o A social norm
- o Mandates
- Culture of vaccinations
- Ease of obtaining
- Moderate politics (not as polarized)
- \circ ~ Teen can get HPV on their own
- Education:
 - o Moderate politics (not as polarized)
 - Teen can get HPV on their own
- Neighbors & Environments:
 - Kids at 12 can have more autonomy/empowered
 - o Law has helped Tdap and HPV
 - o Accessibility (drive thru clinics, embedded in events)
 - o Retailers outside
- Economic Stability:
 - o Free/accessibility
- Health & Healthcare
 - Kids at 12 can have more autonomy/empowered
 - Providers are more comfortable with presenting HPV
 - o Clustering care
 - o Provider knowledge to optimize opportunities to vaccinate
 - o Accountability for medical exemptions
 - o Teens can get HPV on their own
 - o Accountability!
- Parking Lot:
 - o Two systems that are accountable for a health outcome! (education and health)
 - Challenges created by minor consent/access at 12 (when parents can't access, but still need to be responsible)
 - o Industry is more child focused
