What is SB 1383?

Senate Bill 1383: Short-Lived Climate Pollutants is part of a statewide effort to reduce the emissions of short-lived climate pollutants (like methane gas) in various sectors of California's economy.



SB 1383 establishes specific statewide targets:



- Reduce the amount of organic waste going to landfills (50% reduction by 2020 and 75% by 2025)
- Rescue at least 20% of edible food that is currently going to landfills by 2025 and redirect it to people in need

The California Department of Resources, Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) finalized the regulations to achieve the goals of SB 1383 in November 2020. These regulations take effect January 1, 2022.

Short-Lived Climate Pollutants: Why organics?

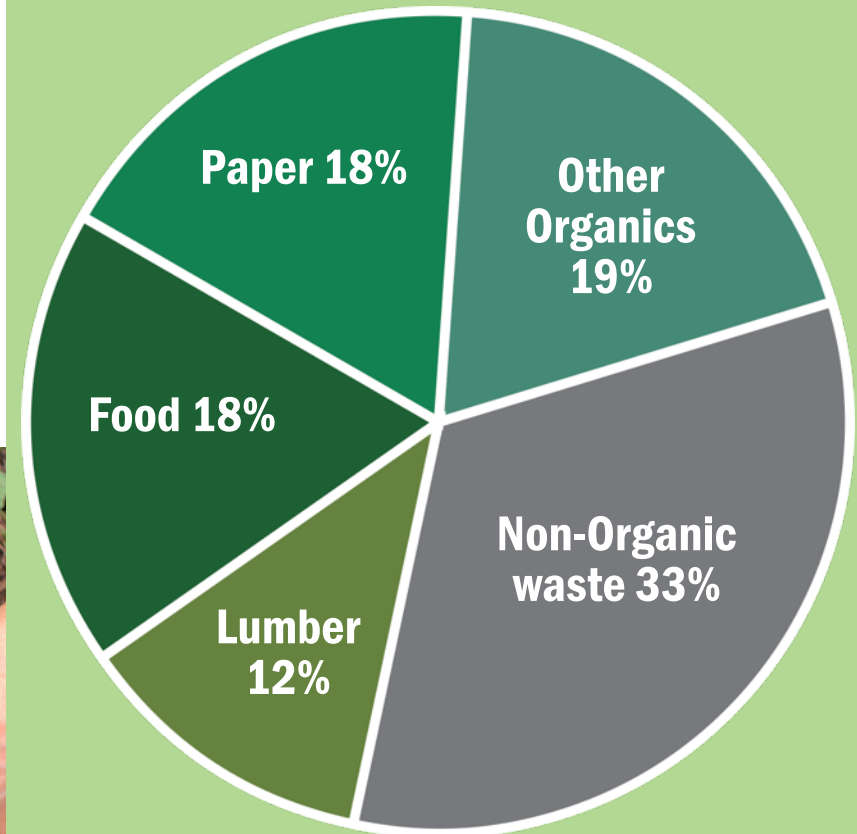
The State has committed to reducing greenhouse gas emissions, improving health, and creating clean jobs that support resilient local economies.

Organic waste in landfills release:

- 20% of the state's methane, a climate super pollutant 84 times more potent than carbon dioxide.
- Air pollutants like PM 2.5, which contributes to health conditions like asthma.



Organics like food scraps, yard trimmings, paper, and cardboard make up more than half of what Californians send to landfills.



Implementing the statewide plan under SB 1383 will reduce methane emissions and is essential to achieving California's climate goals.

What is Organic Waste?

The State defines organic waste as:

- food
- landscape trimmings
- wood
- manure
- paper and cardboard
- paper towels, facial tissue, and other paper products
- and other plant and animal-based products

Many residents and businesses in Yolo County are already recycling these organic materials (thank you!).

The new SB 1383 regulations will expand existing recycling and organics collection programs in our communities.

If you do not already have recycling and organics collection service where you live or work in Yolo County—you will very soon!



Food scraps, food-soiled paper, and yard materials should be composted.



Clean paper and cardboard should be recycled.

SB 1383 requires all residents, businesses, and schools to:

- Subscribe to and participate in recycling and organics collection service.
- Properly sort their organic waste into the correct containers.

Recycling and Organics Collection Bins

State law provides specific requirements for recycling and organics collection bins:

- Businesses, multi-family communities, and schools must have an adequate quantity of and access to recycling, organic, and trash bins.
- Businesses must provide customers with recycling and organic waste bins next to each trash bin. These trash, recycling and organic waste bins must meet either the color OR labeling requirements listed below.

Color Requirements

- Bin lids and/or body must be color-coded:
organics = green, trash = gray or black, recycling = blue
- Existing bins do not need to be replaced until 2036, but all new bins purchased after January 1, 2022 must be color-compliant.



Labeling Requirements

Bins must be clearly labeled with what can and cannot go inside.

Waste Sorting 101

In order to ensure that everyone knows how to sort their waste into the correct bin, the SB 1383 regulations require annual education about how to sort waste properly.



Multi-Family Community Requirements

Property owners and/or managers of multi-family communities must:

- Annually educate employees and tenants on how to properly sort recycling and organic waste into the correct bins.
- Provide information to new tenants within 14 days of occupation of the premises.



Business Requirements

Businesses must:

- Annually educate employees, contractors, customers, and tenants on how to properly sort recyclables and organic waste into the correct bins
- Provide information to new tenants within 14 days of occupation of the premises
- Periodically inspect recycling and organics bins for contamination
- Inform employees if bins are contaminated

Residents

All residents should receive information about proper waste sorting every year, either from their recycling program, local jurisdiction, waste hauler, property manager, or landlord. Please share this waste sorting information with your families, friends, and house mates.

Contamination Monitoring

Monitoring bins for contamination is an essential part of achieving waste diversion goals.

Even if most people sort waste correctly, if enough of the wrong stuff is placed in bins, an entire truckload might be sent to the landfill! Contamination—when something is placed in a bin where it doesn't belong—can be a serious problem for recycling programs.



Make sure the right stuff gets into the correct bin. Proper bin labeling, regular reminders about waste sorting, and monitoring for contamination will ensure a successful program.

Keeping recycling and organic waste streams clean will help ensure that material can be recycled and composted into usable products and will also help develop markets for recycled products in California.



To reduce contamination, businesses and schools must periodically:

- Inspect organic waste containers for contamination
- Inform employees if containers are contaminated
- Instruct employees (and students) how to properly sort material into the correct containers

Food Recovery: Addressing food insecurity

Food recovery is the best use for surplus food and a vital way for California to conserve resources and prevent unnecessary waste from going to landfills.

To reduce food waste and help address food insecurity, SB 1383 directs the following:

- Jurisdictions must establish food recovery programs and strengthen their existing food recovery networks
- Certain businesses* must arrange to recover the maximum amount of their surplus food that would otherwise go to landfills
- Food recovery organizations and services that participate in SB 1383 food recovery must maintain comprehensive records and are subject to compliance inspections

All food donations and distributions must meet the food safety requirements of the California Retail Food Code.

Waste Not, Want Not: Preventing food waste before it starts

Here's a few tips to help keep food from going to waste:

Check before you shop. Next week's meals get their start in the refrigerator. See what needs to be used up, and then think of a meal to make with those items. Check your pantry for the rest of the ingredients and add missing pieces to the shopping list.

Save wilted veggies. Soak bendy carrots, wilted lettuce, limp broccoli, and other wilted veggies in ice water for 5 to 10 minutes to reinvigorate. If they can't be restored, some veggies you intended to eat raw can still taste great when cooked or blended.

Revive stale food. Toast stale chips and crackers for a minute or two in a regular or toaster oven to crisp them right back up. This works for bread, too. Day-or-two-old bread turns into toast.

Make the most of overcooked food. Overcooked vegetables can be transformed into soups or sauces. Just toss them in the blender with some soup stock, milk, or cream.

Composting at Home: Turn organic waste into a nutrient-rich soil amendment

Backyard Composting

4 things to remember with backyard composting:

1. **Aeration:** For fast and healthy aerobic composting, turn the pile once a week.
2. **Temperature:** The higher the temperature of the pile, the faster the decomposition.
3. **Moisture Content:** The pile should be kept moist, but not soggy.
4. **Carbon-Nitrogen Balance:** Try to maintain a balance of 50% dry materials (such as dry leaves and sticks) and 50% nitrogen-rich materials (such as fresh-pulled weeds and grass clippings).



Worm Compost Bin

Got food scraps? Let worms eat them! The goal of worm composting is to create the ideal environment for worms to thrive so they can efficiently decompose fruit and vegetable trimmings. Worm composting is simple, educational, and fun. All you need a box, bedding, fruit and vegetable trimmings, and worms. Visit CalRecycle.CA.Gov/Organics/Worms to learn more.



In-Ground Composting

Compost fruit and vegetable scraps by burying them in your garden.

1. Dig a hole about 12 inches deep.
2. Add 2-3 inches of food scraps.
3. Mix the scraps into the soil, then cover with at least 8 inches of soil.
4. Check occasionally for signs of digging by rodents and other pests.

Food scraps may take 1-6 months to decompose, depending on the season, moisture, soil, and type of food scraps buried. Do not bury more food scraps in the same place until the first scraps have been fully composted.

Textiles: Non-compostable organic material

While some clothing, linens, and other textiles may be made of cotton or other organic materials, they cannot be composted. There are often other fibers (usually plastic) in the fabrics, as well as non-compostable items such as zippers, buttons, tags and plastic threads.

Instead of composting clothing and other textiles, reuse them if possible. Most thrift stores will take them if they are in good condition.

Reuse options

If the fabrics are too damaged to be reused as originally intended, there are other reuse options:

- Some animal shelters will accept old towels and linens as bedding
- Turn old clothes into rags
- Use old socks to cover dusters, then wash the socks and reuse them
- Use old cloth as stuffing for pillows, stuffed animals, quilts, cloth diaper inserts, etc.

Recycling options

While there are no local recycling options for fabrics, clothing and other textiles, there are companies online that offer take-back recycling service for textiles. Search for “textile mail back service” in a browser to find options.

Closing the Loop: Compost and recycled paper

As California collects and recycles organic materials, it is essential that we obtain and use the products made from this recycled organic material, such as recycled-content paper, compost, and mulch.

Why use compost and mulch?

Compost and mulch provide many benefits in landscaping:

- Absorbs falling rain, reducing runoff and erosion
- Improves physical, biological, and chemical properties of soils
- Increases water infiltration rate and water holding capacity
- Conserves water and replenishes groundwater

Why recycled-content paper?

Why not? (Seriously). Recycled-content paper has significant environmental advantages over virgin (non-recycled) paper production. Making paper from recycled fibers results in:

- less impact on forest resources
- less air pollution
- less water pollution
- less water use
- less energy use
- less waste generation



Yolo County Compost

COMPOST AVAILABLE!

Residents can pick up
compost at the Yolo
County Central Landfill



The Yolo County Landfill sells compost to residents for \$10 per yard during their normal operating hours. No appointment is needed, but residents must bring their own shovel and load the compost themselves. Customers in need of a large quantity of compost may inquire about purchasing compost at the main office.

The compost is made at the County's anaerobic compost facility from the organic waste collected from Yolo County jurisdictions. This decomposition process takes less than six months to complete and produces renewable energy and certified organic* compost.

* The composting process achieves temperatures of greater than 130°F and meets the requirements of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations §17855, resulting in the destruction of pathogens and weed seeds. The compost is tested at a certified United States Composting Council laboratory and is certified by the Organic Materials Review Institute as suitable for use in certified organic production.

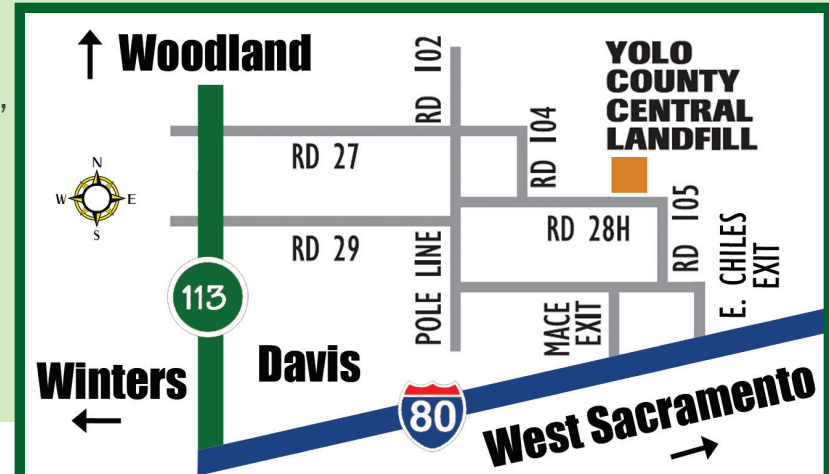
