Prop 47 Cohort 3 Grant Summary

❑ Funder

Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC)

❑ Purpose

Provide mental health services, substance use disorder treatment and diversion programs for people involved in the criminal justice system

❑ Target Population

People arrested, charged with, or convicted of a criminal offense and who have a history of mental health and/or substance use disorders

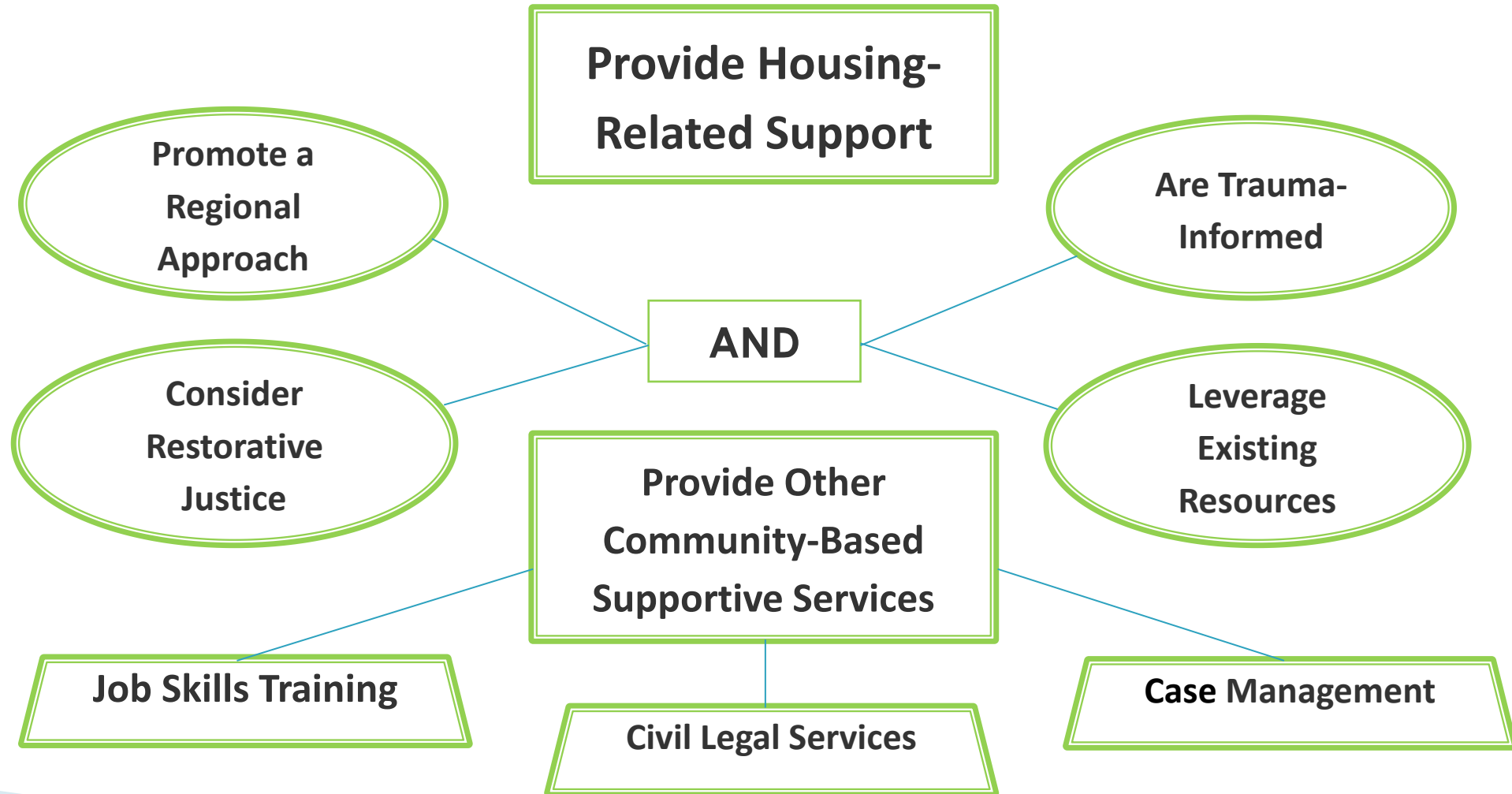
❑ Grant Term

Implementation – September 1, 2022 - March 1, 2023

Service Delivery – March 2, 2023 - March 1, 2026

Data Evaluation – March 2, 2026 – June 1, 2026

Target Population

- BSCC requirements
 - Arrested, charged with or convicted of an eligible P47 offense
 - Mental Health and/or Substance Use Condition
- and
 - Homeless or who have a history of homelessness

Partners

- District Attorney's Office
- Health and Human Services Agency
- Probation
- Public Defender's Office
- Community Based Organizations (TBD)

Funding

- Up to \$1M or \$6M over 42 months
 - 36 months of services
- 70% to CBOs
- 10% for Program Evaluation
- Sole Source & Competitive RFP process

Stakeholder Engagement Process

Community Input - Required component for a successful application

- ❑ 4 Community meetings
- ❑ 1 meeting with local homeless services agencies (Homeless and Poverty Action Coalition (HPAC))
- ❑ 1-3 meeting with individuals currently living homeless in Yolo County
- ❑ 4 Law Enforcement Agency meetings
 - ❑ 1 LEAC
- ❑ 1 Local Mental Health Board
- ❑ 1 NAMI
- ❑ 1 Yolo County Executive Commission to Address Homelessness
- ❑ 1 Multi-disciplinary teams including representatives from:
 - Community-based organizations, District Attorney, Health and Human Services, Probation, Public Defender, Cities

Next Steps

- ❑ Form a Local Advisory Committee (LAC)

Current Yolo County Diversion Programs

- ❑ Incompetent to Stand Trial Diversion (DSH Grant)
- ❑ Restorative Justice Partnership (JAG grant)
 - ❑ 27 receiving HHSA FSP level case management services
- ❑ Mental Health Court (50% JMHC grant)
- ❑ Mental Health Diversion (CCP funds)
- ❑ Addiction Intervention Court

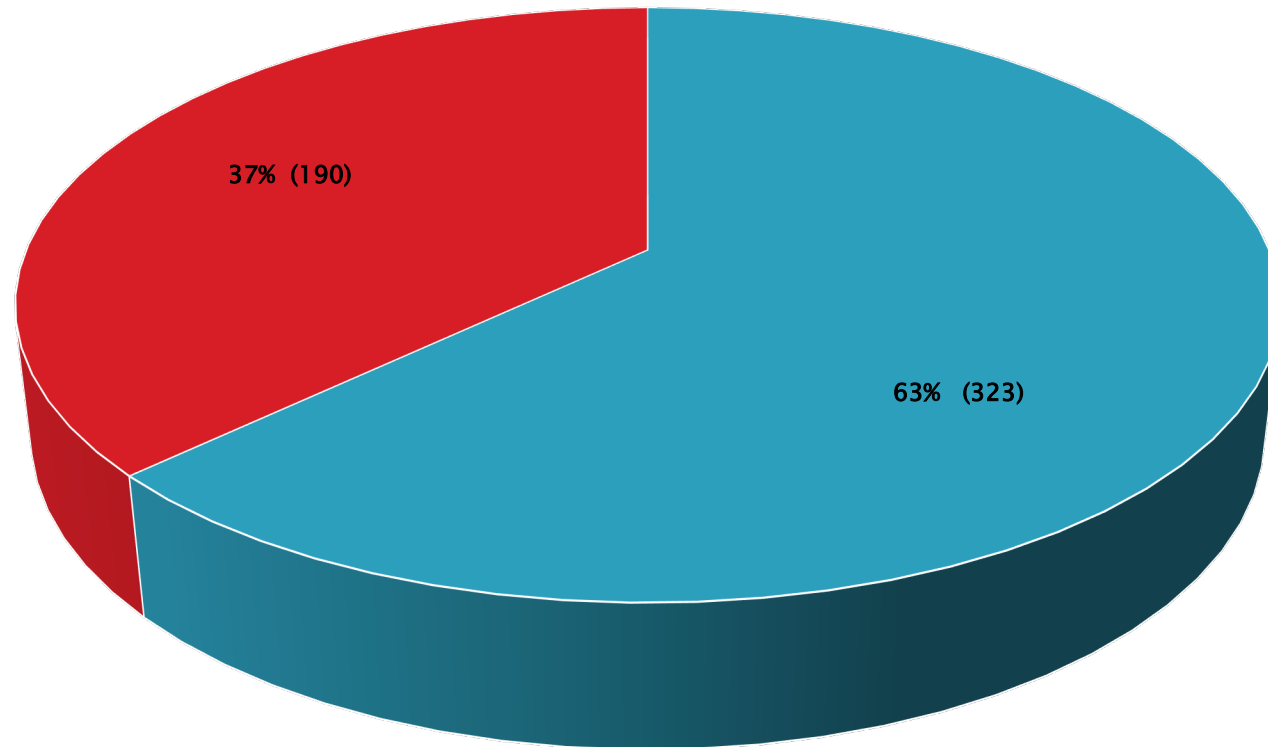
- ❑ Identified Gaps
 - ❑ Programs for Homeless Individuals with a Mental Illness and/or Substance Use Disorder
 - ❑ Mental Health Diversion Supports for Incompetent to Stand Trial Misdemeanor Defendants (PC 1368)

Harm Reduction Diversion

- ❑ Diverting individuals arrested for low level drug and public intoxication offenses out of the Criminal Justice System.
- ❑ By referring those individuals to Health and Humans Services.
- ❑ First Six Months
 - ❑ HHSA received 323 unique individual names
 - ❑ Of those 48 contacted the access line for screening or were already in treatment (14.9%);
 - ❑ Of the 48, 35 ended up in treatment or continued their treatment (10.8%)
 - ❑ The remaining 13 who contacted the access line did not end up being treated
 - ❑ 11 did not complete screening and two contacted the access line because of a mental health crisis and not a substance use disorder.

All Individuals in Harm Reduction Diversion

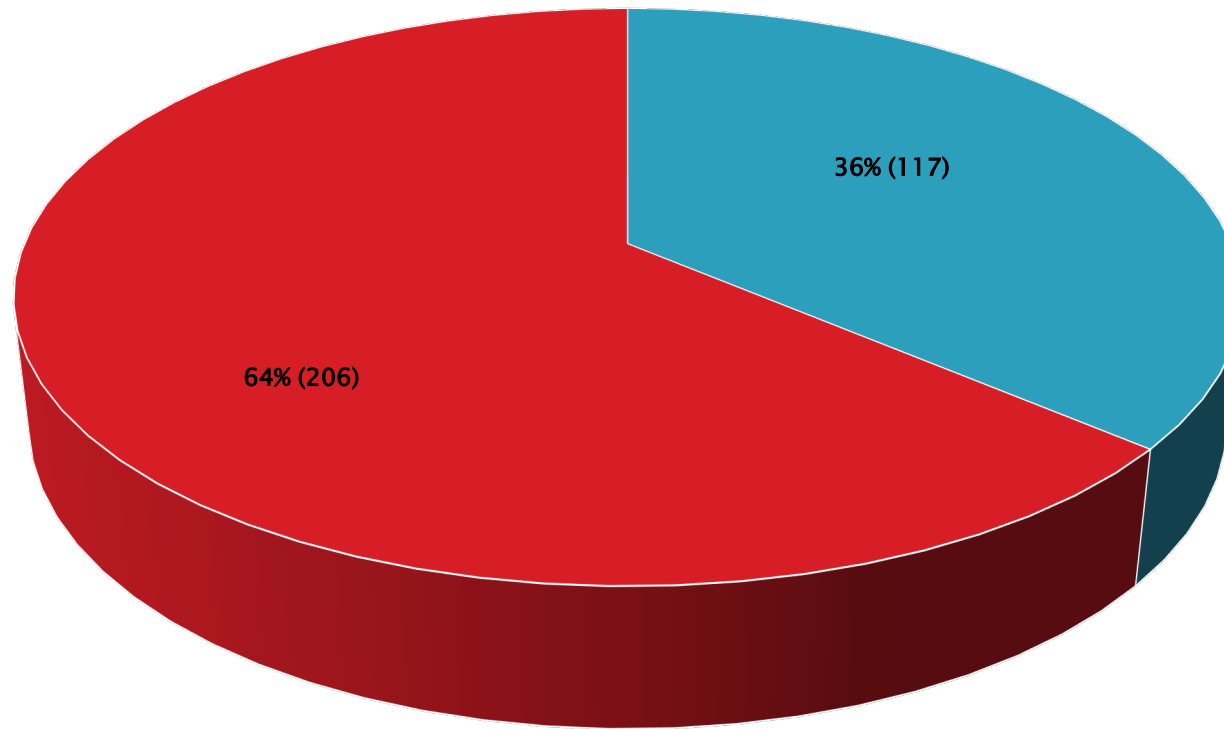
Yolo vs Non-Yolo County Residents (513 total individuals)

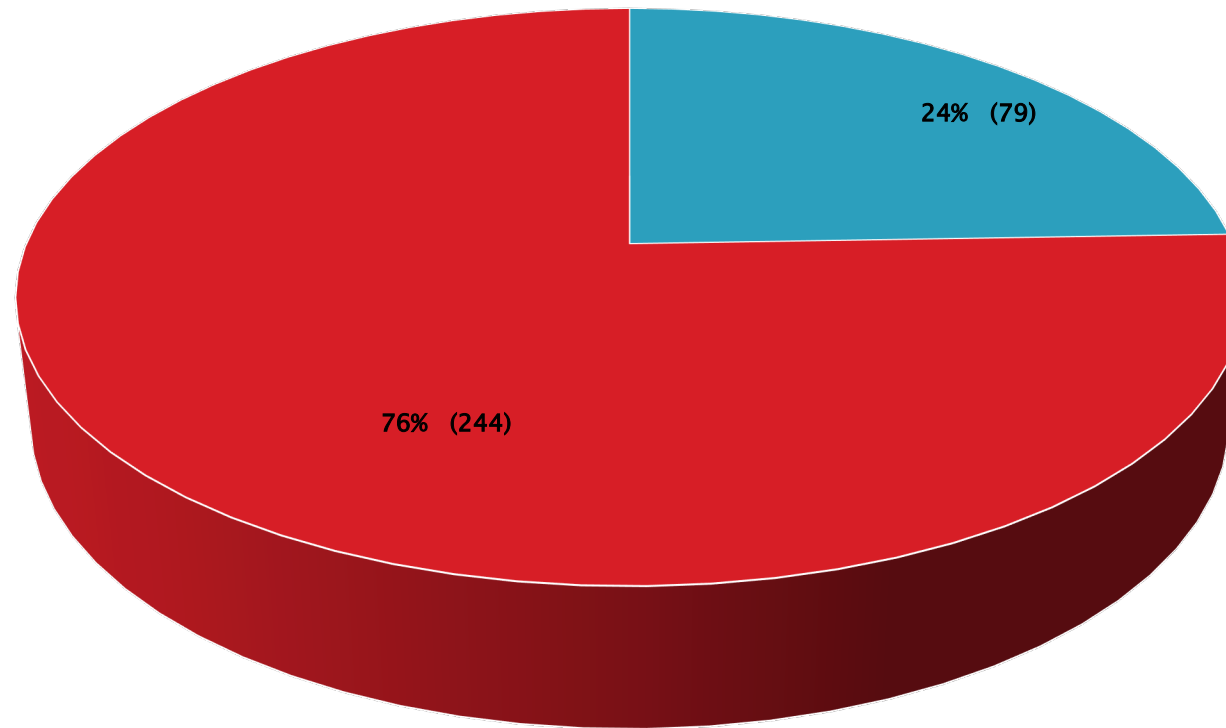
Transient in Police Report vs Total Diverted (323 total individuals)

Yolo County Residents Homeless

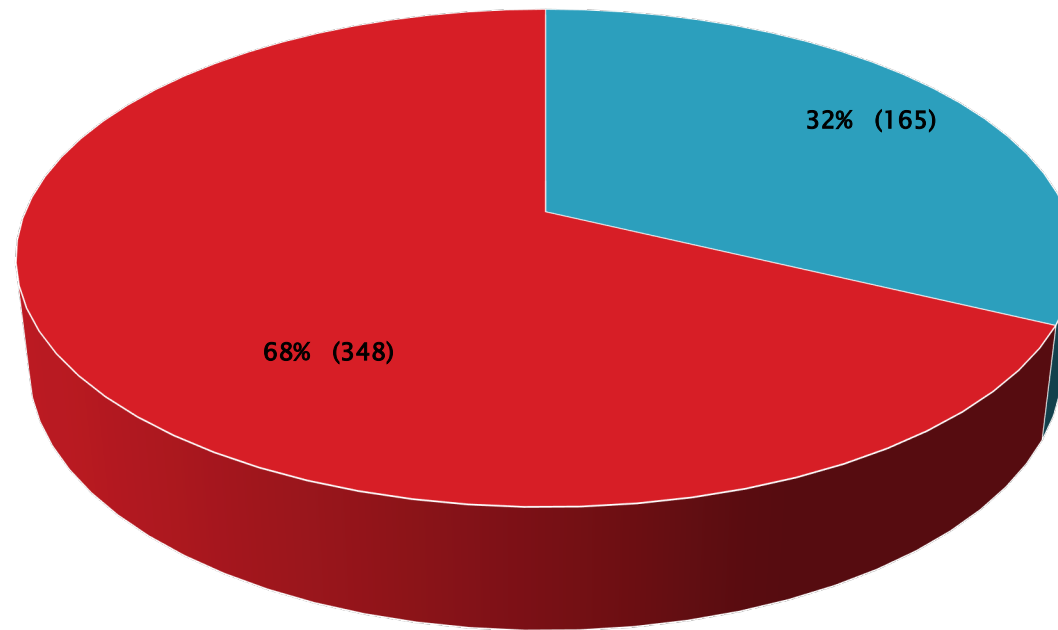
Total Diverted vs HMIS (323 total individuals)

Target Population

- Arrested, charged with or in danger of being arrested for an eligible offense
- Mental Health and/or Substance Use Condition
- Homeless or who have a history of homelessness

- Health and Human Services Agency
- Probation
- Public Defender's Office
- Community Based Organizations (TBD)

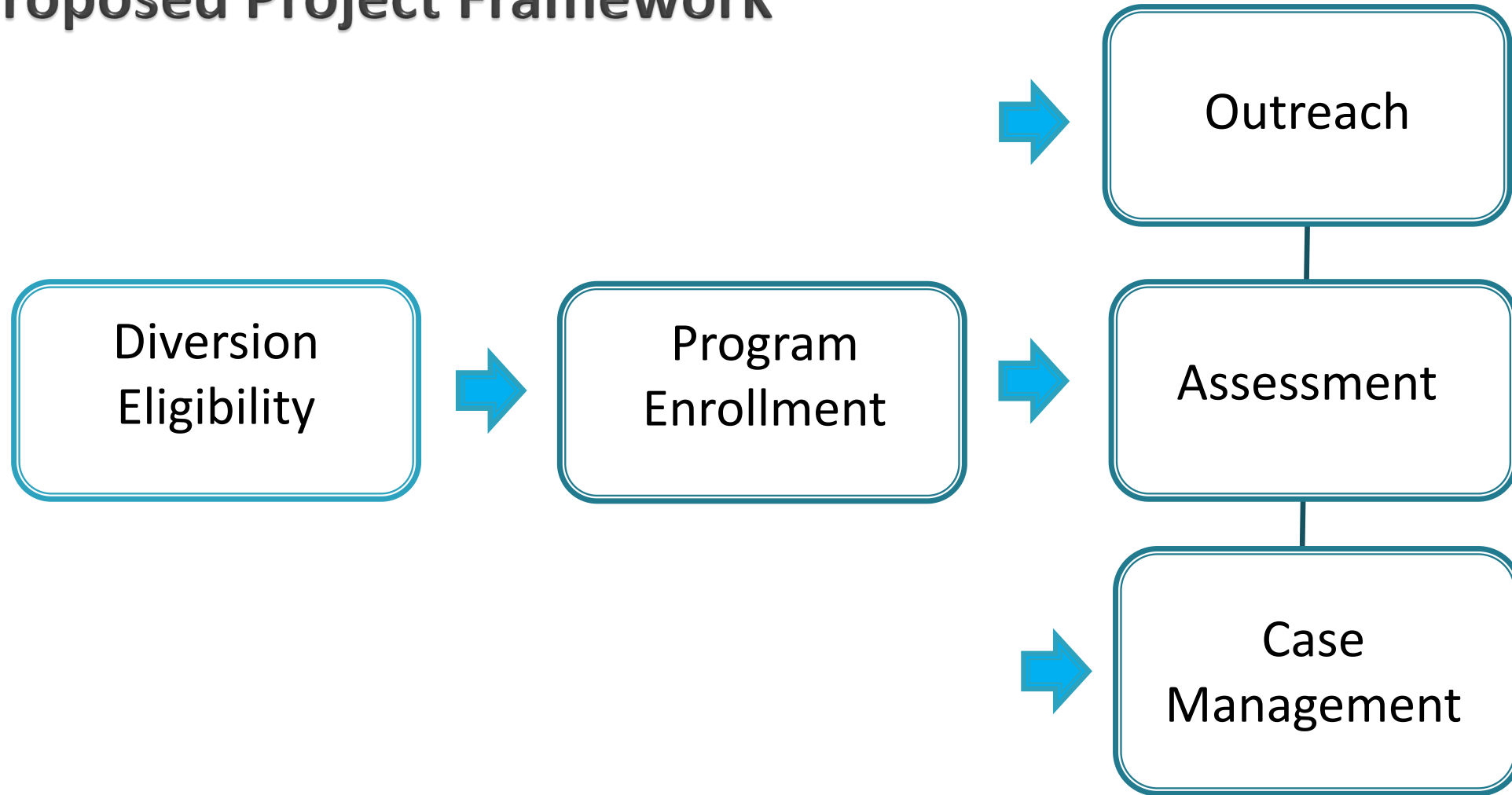
Funding

- Up to \$6M over 42 months
 - 36 months of services
- 30% with County
- 70% to CBOs
 - Sole Source and Competitive RFP process

Diversion Component

- ❑ All project participants must first be approved by the District Attorney's Office, and then voluntarily opt in for participation in the Restorative Justice Partnership Diversion Program
 - ❑ If an individual is not demonstrating successful engagement and participation within 6 months, he or she may be referred to another mental health or substance use program, with a redetermination of continued eligibility for diversion

Proposed Project Framework



Case Management

- ❑ Targeting identified needs in the areas of Self Sufficiency
 - Housing
 - ID, applications
 - Flexible funding for housing related supports
 - Behavioral and Physical Health
 - Behavioral Health – Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder Treatment
 - Linkage to other Supports, such as Physical Health Care and Civil Legal Services
 - Criminal Justice Involvement
 - Risk of recidivism
 - Income
 - Medi-Cal, Cal Fresh, SSI or other sustainability support for the long-term

Draft \$1,000,000 Project Proposal

Target Population

- Misdemeanor Charge Offense Eligible for PC 1001.36 Diversion
- PC 1368 Doubt Declared Mental Health and/or Substance Use Condition


Partners

- District Attorney's Office
- Health and Human Services Agency
- Probation
- Public Defender's Office
- Community Based Organizations (TBD)

Funding

- Up to \$1M over 42 months
 - 36 months of services
- 10% with County (Includes Evaluation)
- 90% to CBOs
 - Sole Source and Competitive RFP process

Mental Health Diversion (Misd IST)

- ❑ Provide Case Management Services
 - ❑ Up to 8-10 individuals
 - ❑ One year Period of Diversion (PC 1001.36)
 - ❑ Stable Housing
 - ❑ Utilizing Existing Board and Care Facilities
 - ❑ Mentor Program
 - ❑ Restorative Justice Component if Appropriate
