In advance of next week's community workshops on how best to spend American Rescue Plan funds, Volo County Supervisor Angel Barajas — who represents north Woodland as well as the communities of Knights Landing, Yolo, Madison, Esparto and the Capay Valley — took to the streets to seek input from Woodland residents.
