9:00 A.M. CALL TO ORDER

The June 8, 2023, Health Council meeting was called to order at 9:01 a.m. by Anthony Volkar, Health Council Chair.

- 4. STATE AND COUNTY UPDATE Mark Bryan, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer
 - Mark Bryan, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer
 - o Budget hearing is next Tuesday, the budget book will be available on the County website.
 - Currently, no significant cuts to the budget are expected.
 - o DEI manager has accepted the position, will start in the near future.
 - New Public Information Officer, Dwight Coddington, started a few days ago.
- 5. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS UPDATE Deputy Supervisor Sheila Allen, District 4
 - Sheila Allen, Deputy Supervisor, District 4
 - Budget from the State is not expected to change, the Federal is not known yet.
 - Having additional discussions about the remaining ARP (American Rescue Plan) funds. Decisions will be announced on July 25th.
 - Next Yolo County Library, being planned and built in Davis, is moving forward. City of Davis voted on and continued to move forward with their allocated budget. It is currently on the architectural phase. Looking for the second round of the State Library Grant to fill the \$2M gap in the budget. This is not expected to stop the process.
 - Dawn Meyers
 - St. John's Retirement Village, has a new board. The County is working with them to renew the lease and get over the finish line.
- 6. HEALTH OFFICER UPDATE Dr. Aimee Sisson, Health Officer
 - Summary of the items covered in the presentation Health Office Update.

- SARS-CoV-2 local wastewater levels are low.
- Masking remains optional.
 - Influenza season ended April 30; unvaccinated HCW no longer required to mask for flu
 - o Press release May 1 announcing change from masking recommended to masking optional
 - Masking strongly recommended in facilities with COVID-19 outbreak (staff, residents, and visitors)
 - Facilities encouraged to develop their own masking policies
 - CDC no longer publishing COVID-19 Community Levels, the basis of previous masking recommendations
- County-run vaccinations ending June 30.
 - Press release planned for mid-June
 - County COVID-19 vaccine clinics will end June 30
 - DoorVax will end June 30
 - Decreased funding, low utilization
 - After July 1, vaccines for general public available at:
 - Healthcare provider
 - Retail pharmacy
 - After July 1, County will remain able to vaccinate in LTCFs
 - o County will likely offer COVID vaccines again in fall
- Paxlovid now has full FDA approval for adults.
 - o On May 25, FDA approved Paxlovid for 18+
 - Paxlovid still under EUA for 12-17 y/o
 - o SesameCare free telehealth consultation remains available through Feb 2024
- Omicron XBB.1.16 causes growing % of cases.
 - XBB.1.16 associated with conjunctivitis, especially in children
 - Not associated with more severe disease
 - o Consider COVID-19 when someone presents with conjunctivitis

7. Public Health Branch Update - Brian Vaughn, Public Health Director

- Jail Health contract are undergoing negotiations.
- MHSA budget will be finalized in a couple weeks.
- Medi-Cal and WIC numbers are increasing.
- Vending machines are being moved around and new products are being added in. Will be testing out the West Sacramento office in a couple of weeks.
- CHIP will be producing a preliminary report, expected to finalize next month.

8. CALAIM UPDATE - Ashley Peel, Partnership HealthPlan of California

- Summary of the items covered in the <u>CalAIM Presentation</u>
- Non-profit, County Organized Health System (COHS) model health plan, serving the Medi-Cal population in 14 counties in Northern California
- NCQA Health Plan Accreditation 2021
- To ensure Medi-Cal recipients have access to high-quality, comprehensive, and cost-effective health care
- CalAIM stands for "California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal."
 - CalAIM is not a singular goal or program; CalAIM is a multi-year, multi-initiative framework being implemented by the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) over the next 5 years.
 - All of the initiatives within CalAIM are focused on transforming the delivery of Medi-Cal services, programs and benefits with a goal of integrating services and improving outcomes.
 - The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved CalAIM and the state's associated waivers on Dec. 29, 2021.
 - DHCS CalAIM proposal: https://www.dhcs.ca.gov/calaim

- Key CalAIM areas of focus:
 - o Population health management, enhanced care management and community supports, services and supports for justice involved adults and youth, ect.
- Enhanced Care Management
 - o A Medi-Cal benefit
 - To qualify, members must meet DHCS criteria outlined "Population of Focus"
 - Goal is to provide a lead, community-based case manager to coordinate: medical, oral, behavioral health, long-term supports and community referral needs – no matter the payer
 - New Populations of Focus are being added by DHCS
- Community Supports
 - Not a Medi-Cal benefit; an optional service that health plans have been allowed to provide
 - The Community Support service can only be approved it demonstrates that is replace a regular Medi-Cal benefit (ex: hospital stay, ED visit, etc.)
 - A menu of 14 optional services for health plans to choose from
- Partnership currently offers the following Community Supports Services:
 - Housing Transition & Navigation Services
 - Housing Deposits
 - Housing Tenancy
 - Short-Term Post Stabilization Housing
 - Recuperative Care (Medical Respite)
 - Medically Tailored Meals
 - Respite Services (Added January 2023)
 - Personal Care/Homemaker Services (Added January 2023)
- Enhanced care management
 - o Fourth and Hope, CommuniCare, Dignity Health Yolo Adult Day Health Center, and more
- Community supports
 - o GA Foods, Mom's Meals, Second Opinion Expert, and more
- · Partnership goals for CalAIM
 - Grow our capacity
 - Focus on quality
 - Investing in infrastructure
 - Support local solutions
- Provider Requirements
 - Experience and expertise in serving the population(s) of focus
 - Primary Care Provider, County Behavioral Health, Tribal Health, Local Government Agency, Community Based Organization, etc.
 - Medi-Cal Enrolled, if current pathway exists
 - If no pathway exists, Partnership contracting and credentialing standards
 - o Treatment Authorization Request (TAR) for ECM/CS Services
 - National Provider Identifier (NPI)
 - Bill for services
 - Invoicing is Permissible
 - Submit necessary reports to Partnership
 - Encounter Data
 - ECM Release of Information (ROIs)
 - ECM Individualized Care Plans (ICPs)
 - Quality Oversight Monitoring Reports

- Any provider interested in becoming an ECM and/or CS Provider must complete and submit an ECM and/or CS Readiness Questionnaire
 - Opportunity to share with Partnership your expertise; not a 'pass/fail' document
 - Email <u>CalAIM@partnershiphp.org</u> to request an ECM and/or CS Readiness Questionnaire if you have not done so already
- Justice Involved Initiative
 - Through the CalAIM 1115 Demonstration, California received federal approval to provide a targeted set of Medi-Cal services to youth and adults in state prisons, county jails, and youth correctional facilities for up to 90 days prior to release
 - California is the first state in the nation to get federal approval to provide pre-release services
 - The goal is to achieve advance health equity, improve health outcomes, and serve as a model for the rest of the nation
 - Eligible Adults include those who have a mental health diagnosis, a chronic clinical condition, an Intellectual/Developmental Disability, or are pregnant or postpartum
 - Eligible Children and Youth includes all youth in correctional facilities, no additional criteria is required
 - Members who meet criteria for Pre-Release Medi-Cal Services will also be eligible to receive Enhanced Care Management services
 - o PATH Funding specifically for Justice Involved is currently open and closes on July 31, 2023
- Covered Pre-Release Services (Fee-For-Service)
 - Re-entry case management services
 - Physical & Behavioral Health Clinical consultation services
 - Laboratory and radiology services
 - Medications and medication administration, including a minimum 30-day supply of covered outpatient prescribed medication and over-the-counter drugs and durable medical equipment (DME) upon release
 - Medications for addition treatment (MAT), for all Food and Drug Administration- approved medications, including coverage for counseling
 - Services provided by community health workers with lived experience
- Post-Release Services (Covered under managed care)
 - Enhanced Care Management (ECM)
 - Community Supports
- Dual Eligible Special Needs Plan (D-SNP)
 - Offers care coordination and wrap-around services to Members dually eligible for Medicare and Medi-Cal
 - Includes a review of MCP utilization data and any available data from outside delivery systems such as In-Home Supportive Services, Behavioral Health, and Pharmacy data in order to identify member needs (Risk Stratification)
 - Members may meet ECM criteria, although there is risk for duplication if a Member receives care management from both programs
- 9. GENERAL HHSA BUDGET, GRANTS AND FUNDING OVERVIEW DISCUSSION Brian Vaughn, Public Health Director
 - HHSA currently has 762 Regular, Limited Term and At-Will full time positions (40% of the County staff).
 - The FY 2022-23 budget for HHSA is \$241,354,673.
 - An estimated 56,380+ clients were directly serviced through one or more HHSA programs with many more indirectly served.
 - The HHSA program inventory includes 68 Programs and 146 Sub-Programs Agency-wide.
 - 2023 Budget Summary:

- o Operating Budget: \$241,354,673
- General Fund Contribution: \$11,653,557
- o Full-Time Equivalents: 762
- Emerging issues The 5 R'S
 - Retain our existing staff focusing on key positions with high rates of turnover
 - o Recruit for increasing vacancies -Yolo HHSA is competitive for key positions in the local job market
 - Re-energize our workforce and Refresh our workspaces after three+ years of COVID operation,
 staff are experiencing high levels of burnout
 - Reconnect our teams with each other and our strategic vision with COVID taking primary focus, we need to regroup

- Administration branch

 - The Admin Branch serves all 760 Regular, Limited Term and At-Will full time HHSA positions as well as additional extra-help and volunteer staff.
 - o The HHSA program inventory includes 11 Programs and 31 Sub-Programs Agency-wide.

 - Staffing turnover and longstanding vacancies for clinical and key leadership positions
 - Priority Local Projects and Mandatory Statewide Initiatives
 - Crisis Now
 - California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM) and payment reform

 - Fiscal Sustainability of Behavioral Health Programming
 - Decades long core mental health budget multi-million \$ deficits

 - o CYF currently has 123 Regular, Limited Term and At-Will full time positions.
 - The FY 2022-23 budget for the CYF Branch includes costs from 7 different budget units totaling \$217,935,334; not all those costs are directly attributable only to CYF.
 - An estimated 4,298+ clients were directly serviced through one or more CYF programs with many more indirectly served.
 - The CYF program inventory includes 21 Programs and 36 Sub-Programs.
- Service Centers Branch
 - Service Centers currently has 260 Regular, Limited Term and At-Will full time positions.
 - The FY 2022-23 budget for the Service Center Branch includes costs from 4 different budget units totaling \$130,120,647; not all those costs are directly attributable only to SC.
 - An estimated 56,460+ clients were directly serviced through one or more Service Centers programs with many more indirectly served.
 - The Service Centers program inventory includes 11 Programs and 15 Sub-Programs Branch-wide.
 - Eligibility Priorities
 - CalFresh efforts to increase participation
 - DOC for application backlog
 - Medi-Cal and end of Public Health Emergency (PHE)
 - Meeting program timeframes
 - Employment Services Priorities
 - Reengaging CalWORKs participants post PHE
 - Increasing housing capacity for homeless CalWORKs families
 - Workforce development in a recovering economy
 - Supporting farmworkers
 - Future Challenges
 - Increased workload and delayed services
 - Underfunded, particularly in CalFresh
 - Recruitment and retention
 - Staffing shortages especially in CalFresh and Medi-Cal

- Public Health Branch
 - HHSA currently has 128 Regular, Limited Term and At-Will full time positions.
 - The FY 2022-23 budget for the Public Health Branch includes costs from 4 different budget units totaling \$35,621,986; not all those costs are directly attributable only to PH.
 - Public Health programs impact and serve all 222,115 Yolo County Residents and the 46,807 workers commuting into the county weekly.
 - The HHSA program inventory includes 12 Programs and 28 Sub-Programs Agency-wide.
 - Opportunities

- The role of Public Health has never been more important than it is today
- Through the pandemic, we have managed to build a stronger public health infrastructure in Yolo County
- Threats
 - >90% of COVID funding will be gone by FY24-25
 - After 3+ years of pandemic response, staff need time and resources to recover
 - New funding and revenue growth has been largely eaten up by increases in staff costs, inflation, and indirect costs
- To support Public Health in Yolo County
 - Advocate for additional state and federal funding to support public health infrastructure and prevention efforts.
 - Support Public Health to re-launch our Healthy Yolo initiative
 - Health In All Policies (HIAP)
