### C. Staff to develop FAQ and Webpage on NWL Working Group

#### **MEETING NOTES**

### 1. Staff Updates

- Today's main goal is to come to a consensus on the priorities for working group goals and member recruitment.
- Starting March 1<sup>st</sup>, the working group will have to move to an in-person format.
  - This conversation can be held in greater detail in January. Some changes that could be made include longer bi-monthly meetings instead of shorter monthly meetings.
- Stipend distribution will likely be an opt-in format where those interested will fill out a form to be considered a vendor.
- Setting up an Interview with the CAAP Consultant Team
  - One of their first tasks will be deep dive conversations with each Working Group where they can assess priorities and goals.
- San Mateo County recently finished a similar process, K. Reza and H. Nichols are hoping to set up a meeting between Yolo County RCD and San Mateo RCD to learn takeaways from setting up a working lands portion of the CAAP.

# 2. Discuss Working Group Recruitment/Outreach

- Staff created a spreadsheet to try and capture recommended points of contact for potential working group members or one-on-one points of contacts for interviews.
  - Action Item for Staff: Create another column on the spreadsheet to specify whether contacts are for recruitment or general outreach, topic point roundtables, interviews etc.
- Having a Diverse Working Group is an important priority to the group.
  - The spreadsheet is a good resource to see the types of perspectives that can be involved in the Working Group.
  - At a minimum, perspectives from small scale farming communities, large scale farming communities, and ranchers should be considered for holding regular seats in working group meetings.
  - Farmworkers should also be included since they will most greatly feel the effects of climate change on farming practices.
  - Farmworkers could be represented in the working group through thirdparty representatives by bringing on farmers with expertise in migrant workers and farmworkers.
  - Farmworkers should be included and at a minimum their input should be included in working group meetings.
  - In-person meetings during work hours would make it difficult for farmworkers to participate regularly as part of the core group.

- First calls to be to real farmers. RCD brought up Fritz Durst, the Rominger brothers, Jim Etters, Scott Stone, Good Humus Farms, etc.
  - Suggested bringing on people who must implement these strategies as core working group members. She also suggested those who have high stakes in their properties.
- Farm Bureau doesn't often have the bandwidth to participate regularly but would like to keep in touch with the working group's developments regularly.
- Bringing on new farmers and conventional farms because they might be more willing to implement climate adaptation changes.
- RCD offered to give a presentation to the Farm Bureau to show them strategy plans and updates.
- Rice Growers Association, Mariani Nuts, West Valley Ag, etc. might have more capacity to participate and they have a wide reach in the farming community to hear concerns.
- Center for Land Based Learning has a program for new farmers entering the farm industry. Craig McNamara could also be a point of contact for this.
- Are there any gaps of expertise given the three main contacts and current?
  - Water use in Ag
    - Would be useful to reach out to Flood Control Water Conservation?
- How CAAP development will have influence on the discussions held in this forum?
  - Land conservation can be considered a climate change strategy and that land conversion should be considered as part of the CAAP.
  - With land development, land will usually be annexed to a nearby city. He said that mitigation policy might call for equal amounts of land being conserved as there are being developed.
- Staff summarized that there are five potential new members being considered:
  - Small scale farmers
  - Large scale farmers
  - Ranchers
  - Farmworkers
  - New/young farmers
- Young farmers may be best for interviews and not for being a core member.
- CAFF could bring in farmworker and young farmer perspectives.
  - RCD works closely with CAFF and could fulfil that role.
- The Working Group agreed that there would be four buckets of outreach for core member recruitment
  - Small scale irrigated agriculture,

- Large scale irrigated agriculture,
- Ranchers,
- A representative of the farmworker community.
- When finding members to fill those seats in the core group, to prioritize diverse and non-traditional perspectives such as a female-owned farm, LGBTQ+ owned farm, BIPOC owned farm, young farmers etc.
- RCD is dedicated to getting as many voices heard as possible. She said that she welcomes feedback if people feel like this goal is not being met.
- Member of the core group could fall into multiple of the desired buckets to broaden perspectives.

# 3. Discuss Next Steps

- First round of outreach:
  - H. Nichols said that she can report back on her initial points of contact between now and the January Working Group Meeting.
- The full working group is expected to meet in full in February.
- Dudek plans to meet with the core group before the full Working Group kicks off to understand goals and priorities.
- Action Item: Draft a FAQ Sheet.
